Now he is quite an enthusiast in the business, and his spare moments are spent in beautifying his premises. One magnificent palm about ten or twelve feet high appears in the front. About two weeks ago Mr. Neil McKechnie of the firm of N. G. & J. McKechnie received a letter dated Paris, June 9, 1869, and containing 60c. in three cent Canadian stamps recent issue, in payment of a debt, and asking for a receipt for same. The date of posting on the front of the letter was not sufficiently legible to make out easily where it was mailed, but on the other side plain enough the Tilsonburg and Durham stamp marks could be easily seen. Sensational reports were circulated, a stamp collector thinking a sixty cent find of the "Beaver" issue was quite a bonanza, made his way to Mr. McKechnie's to negotiate a deal, but felt somewhat disappointed when the common three cent stamp was produced. The writing on both envelope and letter appeared as if they might be of recent date, and there is nothing strange about the matter more than the date on the letter. It is reported that the person from whom the letter was sent has been dead for over twelve years, but this too may be a mere piece of fiction. Mr. McKechnie doesn't remember anything of the debt and hasn't tried to hunt up the account.

**Plebiscite Meeting.**

A meeting of temperance workers was held in the Presbyterian church on Monday night last. Mr. Jno. H. Brown was chairman, and in the absence Mr. T. Allan, the Rev. Reports were presented showing that the Townships of Proton, Egremont, and Bentinck had made progress in organization, and Glenelg it was expected would soon follow.
