Hugh Cole's Mangled Body Found on the Railroad Track.

On Saturday, August 6th, about 11:30 p. m., while a couple of men were walking along the Flint, Pere & Marquette track at the foot of S. First street west, they came across the mangled remains of a man lying on the track. They reported their startling find at the depot, and when a crowd had gathered, the remains which had escaped facial disfigurement, were readily identified as those of Hugh Cole, a young man well known about the city. Dr. Cady empanelled a jury and adjourned the inquest until Wednesday at 1 o'clock at his office.

It is supposed that Cole was walking along the track about 10:30 o'clock when he was struck by a freight train which pulled in from the south about that time. The last seen of the unfortunate man alive as far as is known was on Saginaw street about 10:30 o'clock apparently in a condition to take care of himself. When found he had some small change in his pocket.

The remains were removed to Garner's undertaking rooms where they were prepared for burial. The funeral was held Monday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the residence of his brother, Wm. Cole, No. 413 Smith street.

The deceased was 39 years of age and unmarried. He has relatives in Durham and Glenelg who will learn with regret of his sad ending.
