The Council met Aug. 15th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present; the Reeve in the chair; minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications and accounts read as follows: From C. McLean, repairing scraper; from Lucas & Wright, legal advice re McMillan Estate; from the Treasurer, a statement re the McMillan Estate; from County Treasurer, tax Sale List.

By-law 377 striking rates as follows was read a first and second time. County rate 2 1/4-10 mills; township rates, 5 mills; general school rate, 2 1/2 10 mills; section rates as required by trustees.

Firth-McMillan-That John Quillinan be paid \$900 for grading at lot 21, con. 10—Carried.

Williams-Firth-That William Ritchie be paid \$6 for equalizing two School sections—Carried.

Williams-McFadden-That the following accounts for gravel be paid: John Colbert \$4, Bennett Jenkinson \$4 Thos. McGirr \$3, and Andrew Lindsay \$4—Carried.

Firth-McMillan-That the Reeve be paid \$2 for expenses to Markdale for legal advice re McMillan Estate.—Carried.

McMillan-Firth-That the account of C. Ramage for printing Voters' Lists amounting to \$18.24 and \$1.30 for advertising the posting up of the same be paid.—

McMillan-McFadden-That D. G. McLean be paid 50 cents for repairing scraper. Also that the Treasurer of Artemesia be paid \$2 30 half cost of repairing two culverts on townline G. & A.—Carried.

McMillan-McFadden-That Timothy McKenna be paid \$4 for building culvert at lot 7, con. 3, E. G. R.—Carried.

McFadden Firth-That Thos. Turnbull be paid \$4.05 for grading at lot 1 of 19, con. 1, E. G. R.—Carried.
