of the bachelor trustees were proof against the persuasive tones of the gifted agent, so with threatening retribution swift and sure he departed.

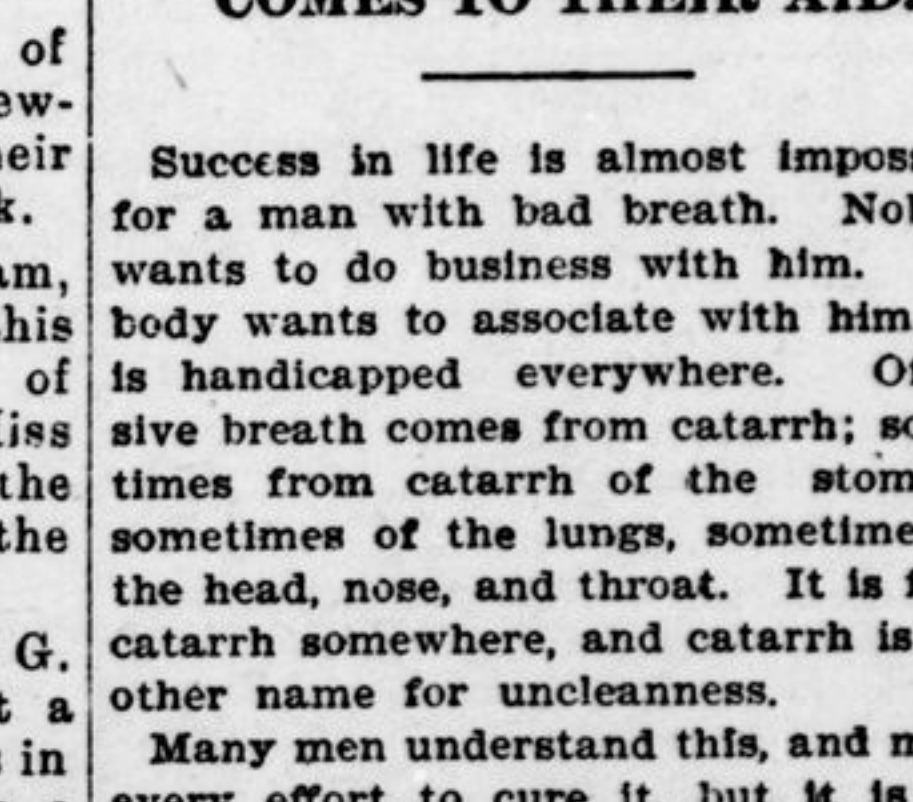
