PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY Given that, pursuant to the By-Law on that behalf, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Durham proposed to proceed with the construction of

Granolithic Sidewalks

Under the Initiative System of said By-Law, as follows: Beginning at MacFarlane's corner on the south side of Mill Street and extending east along the South side of said street to the School House. The width of said proposed walk to be six feet and the crossings 3½ feet. The total estimated cost of said improvements, according to Engineer or Overseer's report dated October 3rd, 1898, and now on file in the Clerk's Office, is \$455.40, of which the Town's share is \$46.20, payable in twenty equal annual instalments sufficient to cover interest at the rate of 4% per annum with a sinking fund for the said principal sum, and the lands proposed to be equally assessed therefor consist of:
