Haste—M. Innis—That the account of Mrs. Tribe for rent be not entertained.—Carried.  
Councillor McQueen reported that he let the following road improvements on the Egremont and Proton town line between the 4th and 8th con.—To John Dory 10 1/2 rods grading and graveling, gravel 6 feet wide by 6 in. deep at \$1.25 per rod \$13.12; do. covering municipal drain with tar-paste planks 2 in. thick, 10 feet long and rep. the railway cost \$7.25; do. removing a stone a total \$21.12. Egremont's share \$10.56. Also on the Egremont and Arthur town line; to John Keith and Wm. Donald covering Thos's bridge with 3 in. oak elm plank and repair; g. at in., cost \$15. A culvert at lot 18, con. 4, townline, 1 1/2 feet square; sound cedar, cost \$8.75; eighteen rods ditching at 25c. per rod, 1 foot deep, 2 feet wide at bottom, cost \$4.25; covering culvert a lot 22, con. 3, townline, hewed cedar 6 inch face, 15 feet long 2 1/2 feet wide cost \$15, total \$44.25. Egremont's share \$22.12; also the contract of filling the east approach to Drewrey's bridge, culvert and raising on sides of embankment to Geo. Arthur, cost \$90. All is completed, payment received.
