# BENTINCK COUNCIL.

Court of Revision for the Township of Bentinck for the year 1899 was held at Allan Park on Thursday the 25th of May. Members of the Council all present. Court was constituted by appointing the Reeve as chairman, when the following appeals were heard: George Bailey, assessment reduced \$100; Henry Miller assessment confirmed; Wm. Willis, assessment on lot 38. Con. 1 S. D. R. reduced \$150; Jacob Knechtel, asmt. reduced \$50; Scaefe Bros., assessed for lot 48 con. 3, W. G. R.; Thomas Tompkins, assessed for lot 42 and 43, con. 1, N. D. R. There being no further appeals to deal with, Court adjourned and the Council met for general business.

Minutes of February meeting read and passed. The assessment roll as revised by the Court of Revision was ordered to be received and the Assessor paid his salary of \$80.00. Petition received from W. J. Derby and others asking aid to improve S. L. 63 and 64, con. 3, W. G. R., referred to Commissioner Brown. Application received from the Knechtel Furniture Co. for permission to build an overhead bridge on Victoria St. Hanover, was granted. The application of Henry Ruppenthal and others for exemption from taxes for 10 years on a chair factory to be built in Elmwood was granted.

Messrs Brown and McDougal, a committee appointed at last session, on deviation at Hutton's Hill, reported: That Mr. Hutton would not sell right of way.

Mr. James Hillis made application for the improvement of the town line Bentinck and Normanby at lots 8 and 9. Referred to commissioner Leslie for joint action with Normanby Council.

Road Commissioners reported having expended money on roads as follows: Mr. Adlam, \$16.00, in road division No. 1; Mr. Brown \$4.50, in R. D. No. 2; Mr. Leslie, \$6.50 in R. D. No. 3; and Mr. Hastie, \$10.50 in R. D. No. 4.

The following accounts were passed and ordered to be paid: Arch, Park, \$4.50, filling washout on S. L. 50, con. 3, S. D. R.; Alex. Grierson, 40c. for clevis broken at Statute Labor; Robert Kennedy, \$1.00 for wagon axle broken at Statute Labor; Wm. Scarfe, \$1.50 for removing drift wood from Stinson's bridge; Dr. Gun \$11.75 for medical attendance on widow Fawcett; John Walker \$25.00 for making road on con. 14, lots 22 and 23; the Reeve, \$2.00 for expenses in Bryden's suit against Township of Bentinck and Brant, and the "Post" printing office \$30 printing accounts.

Mr. Leslie was appointed to purchase four road scrapers for use in the township.

The clerk was ordered to give the necessary notice of the intention of council to pass a by-law at next meeting closing the original road allowance on 2nd and 3rd con., S. D. R., from townline to side road No. 10. No gravel for roads to be paid for by council unless by order of the commissioner for the division.

The treasurer was instructed to borrow money sufficient to pay Hanover
