**With the 31st in Camp.**

(Special Correspondence.)

On Tuesday morning, June 6th, the Vol-  
unteers of Co. No. 4 set out for their annual  
drill at Niagara. After an uneventful  
journey we safely reached the Queen City  
about 11:30 a. m., when the company was  
immediately formed up and marched to  
the Young street wharf. Here it was learned  
that the Meaford and Thornbury companies  
had arrived earlier and had left for Niagara  
on the preceding boat. We had to wait  
some time for the Owen Sound companies,  
but as we did not know how soon they  
would join us no one was allowed to leave  
the dock. After a three-quarters of an hour  
wait the O. S. coy's arrived and all marched  
on board the Chicora which had just arrived.  
The moorings were cast off and we had a  
very pleasant voyage across the lake. Al-  
though the boat was crowded no accidents  
happened. The number of troops in camp  
was about 4,350. This camp has been a  
very busy one for both officers and men and  
very little time has been left for recreation.  
There has been a good deal of new drill  
gone through this year which required  
some study on the part of the officers. On  
Saturday Maj. Gen. Hutton arrived from  
London and took command. Sunday a  
grand church parade was formed up.  
Thursday a telegram was sent to Col. Tel-  
ford, commanding the 31st Batt., to advance  
and hold Queen's Heights (Dated Thur-  
day 5 a. m.) At seven the Batt. started and  
the march of seven miles was made in re-  
gulation time according to the two umpires  
who accompanied the column. They were  
unostentatious in their praise of the 31st, which  
was accompanied by a troop of the Royal  
Canadian Dragoons. Just as the column  
reached the heights Captain Bell, Maj. Gen.  
Hutton's A. D. C., galloped up and deliv-  
ered a message. The morning had been  
threatening, dark clouds hovered around  
and it had sprinkled during the night and  
occasionally during the march. As the  
Batt. arrived at the heights a heavy down-  
pour commenced. The men sought cover  
and found out in a short time, to their dis-  
appointment, that the A. D. C.'s message  
was that the battle had been cancelled on  
account of the wet. A large crowd had  
gathered, some from quite a distance, to see  
the battle and their disappointment was  
also very great. Capt. Galbraith, No. 4 Co.,  
and Capt. Richardson, No. 6 Co., had with  
the Col's permission left their companies in  
command of their Lieutenants, Snider and  
MacFarlane respectively, and left at an  
early hour to reconquer the position. This  
duty they had performed in a most satis-  
factory manner, locating springs for water  
supply and all the natural advantages of  
the ground, also locating suitable places for  
halts on the march and placing signals in  
various places. After all companies had  
disposed of their hard tack and cheese the  
Battalion again formed up and started for  
camp. A short distance from it they were  
met by the band and swung into the grounds  
in fine style and with the cheers of the other  
troops. The enemy it appears had marched  
out about three and a half miles, and were  
actually in sight of the heights when the  
order was given to retire.

Thursday evening a levee was held at  
which all the officers were presented to the  
Gov. Gen., Lord Minto. A grand military  
tattoo was held immediately after the levee  
with music by the ten massed bands and  
the pipers' band of the 88th Highlanders  
amidst a grand display of fireworks.  
Friday being the last day was of course  
Reveille Day. Before the parade formed up  
Hon. Mr. Borden and the Maj. Gen. com-  
manding passed through the lines chatting  
with the Colonels of the different regiments.  
The review passed off in fine style, fol-  
lowed by a brilliant cavalry charge. The artillery  
of A Battery, Kingston, and the Infantry of  
an imaginary foe and then opened fire on  
the Line and British also made a combined at-  
tack which afforded the view of a line  
of battle firing a withering fire  
into the ranks of an imaginary enemy. The  
men had each been served with twenty  
rounds of blank ammunition. The 31st be-  
longed to the 3rd Brigade, under Col. Otter,  
which consisted of the 12th, 31st, 34th, 35th  
and 36th Battalions Infantry of the line.

\$20; Lot 14, con. 5, put on N. R. Roll; Lot  
53, con. 2 N. D. R. assessed to John Mc-  
Lachlan; Dugald McLachlan assessed as  
owner for Lots 51 and 52, con. 2 N. D. R.;  
James McDougald assessed as tenant on  
Wm. D. R. assessed to John Keyland; Fred.  
N. D. R. assessed as tenant for Lots 11 and 12,  
con. 2 N. D. R.; Hugh McGinnis assessed  
as tenant for Lots 33, cons. 2 and 3 N. D. R.;  
Wm. Moran assessed instead of Jas. Vessie;  
W. J. Levy assessed for Lot 9, con. 4 N. D. R.;  
R. instead of John Sweeney; Thos. Nichol  
assessed for Lot 52, con. 1 N. D. R. instead  
of Watson Bros. The Roll as so revised was  
passed, and the Court rose.

After Court of Revision the Council met  
for general business. Members all present.  
The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of former  
meetings read and confirmed.

\$1; A. McQuarrie, repairing culvert lot 47,  
con. 2 N. D. R., \$1; Wm. Irwin, printing

pair of culvert lot 11, con. 10, \$5; A. Bell,  
balance of salary as assessor, \$30; A. Bell,  
equalizing two School Sections, Genelev &  
Bentinck, \$6; The Clerk, postage, \$1.33;  
Jas. Staples and John McMillan, Townline  
Committee, \$2 each, \$4.  
Lamb—McMillan—that the Clerk notify  
P. H. Bryce that we, as a Council, would  
prefer leaving the matter of vaccination  
over for this season owing to the very heavy  
losses we have sustained by bridges being  
carried away and roads otherwise seriously  
damaged by the spring floods. We would  
therefore request this as a favor.—Carried.  
Fifty dollars for each ward was appropri-  
ated for repairing roads.  
Council adjourned to July 3 at 10 a. m.
