At ten minutes to five on Friday afternoon last, it was discovered that N. G. & J. McKechnies' factory was on fire, and immediately the bell from Smith's Tannery sounded the alarm. The crowds at once began to rush towards the fire while the firemen made for the fire hall.

The engine arrived, attachments were made, but steam wasn't quite up and the building was being rapidly consumed. No one would have given much for the chances of any wooden material in the building.

It was a hard fight, but no energy was spared. The firemen made every minute tell. The flames were being subdued, but at every moment the roof and upper storey were expected to tumble a fiery avalanche upon the floor below.

But there was no relaxation of energy, and for nearly two hours, the boys fought like demons, and conquered, though Messrs McKechnie are heavy losers. The manufactured goods in the upper flat were a complete loss.

Others as well as the firemen showed that they were not lacking in sand when an emergency came. Alex McLaughlan, Con. Knapp, and Lawyer Davidson were right to the front and like old hands, handled the nozzles with telling effect.
