HOW TO COOK FRUIT.

Always cook fresh fruits in boiling water; generally but a small amount is required. If economy is a point to be considered, do not add sugar until the fruit is done, as sugar cooked with an acid is converted into glucose, and it will require nearly twice as much sugar to give the same sweetness to the fruit if added before cooking as it will if added when the fruit is done. On the other hand, if the fruit is one which you desire to keep whole, sugar added to the fruit will aid in this dithe factor, as it abstracts the juice of the fruit, thus slightly hardening it, Projecting its falling to pieces. Fruit, in cooking, should not be allowed to beil hard, as hard boiling destroys its flavors by excessive evap-
