MISTAKES OF THE TREE PLANTER

We will mention only in a general way the many mistakes made by the tree-planters in choosing wrong varieties or a bad location or buying trees from irresponsible parties, or a number of other things which might properly come under the head of treeplanting, but will confine our remarks to the common errors committed by the usual tree-planter in the actual work of planting the tree, writes H. W. Jenkins.
