The Orangemen in Owen Sound.
The Orange Demonstration in Owen Sound on the 12th is reported by the town papers as an unprecedented success. The crowd in attendance was immense, the day was fine, and every available spot for man and beast was filled to its utmost capacity. Hotels, restaurants and eating houses were literally jammed. In addition to those who made their way to the County Capital through the various arteries of travel, excursions by the Grand Trunk and Canada Pacific Railway brought in large numbers of pleasure seekers. The former road brought about two thousand from Warton, Chesley and intermediate stations, while the arrival of the C. P. R. augmented the throng by nearly another two thousand.

A number of excursionists also brought in from Warton, Chesley, Thornbury, Collingwood and Meaford. The chief speakers were Mr. E. T. Clark, M. P., of Toronto and Dr. Sproule, of Markdale, and Mr. W. T. Goffe representing the Trade Review.

No. 1 Company of the Boys Brigade were in the van. The bands in the procession were the Citizens Own and the Thirty first of Owen Sound. Durhalk silver band, Markdale, Tara, Thornbury, Collingwood and Shallow Lakes bands. Almost every rural lodge had its complement of life and drum music.

Durham and its surroundings were well represented by Lodge No. 632 Durham, John Williams, Master; No. 689 Varney, Jas. Egan, Master; No. 1192 Glenelg, Geo. Alpe, Master; No. 668 Allan Park, Wm. Brigham, Master; No. 861 Drumore, MacKenzie, Master.

Nearly every part of the County was represented by its lodge being present, and the gathering is believed to be the largest ever held in this County. Of course Owen Sound has advantages, by way of Railway and Boat facilities, not enjoyed by other places, and in addition to this they take the very wise precaution of telling the public when they expect to have a big day.

Ere long we expect it will be Durham's turn to hold an Orange Demonstration and we hope the liberal turn out from here and vicinity may not be forgotten.
