NEARLY GOT THERE.—A special dispatch to the Globe from St. John N. B. regarding the election of a rector for Trinity Church there says: "An adjourned meeting of the Trinity Anglican Church was held to-night to elect a rector. The report of the delegation which went to Ontario was that Rev. J. C. Farthing, of Woodstock, was a low Churchman. The delegation also spoke in extremely high terms of Mr. Farthing. The names of Mr. Farthing and Rev. J. A. Richardson of Winnipeg were placed before the meeting. Two ballots were taken, Rev. Mr. Richardson leading by four and six, but as two thirds vote was necessary Mr. Farthing's name was withdrawn. There were strong protests against it, but by a standing vote Mr. Richardson was chosen. 70 voting for him and 14 against." Mr Farthing was rector of Trinity Church here a few years ago, and very highly respected.

A Blaze at the People's Mill.

Strange, we had scarcely completed our request to the citizens to attend the Firemen's picnic on the 10th of August when the bells rang out the alarm of a fire in the People's Mill, and the throng at once, was seen to rush in the direction of the conflagration. As soon as discovered that it was only the mill shed the anxiety became abated, and all felt sure that the Firemen would save the mill from destruction. Campbell's Livery team was soon hitched to the engine and was spinaing along Mill Street to the Fire. Mr. Dan McLeod, a Glenelg farmer, had his team tied to one of the posts, and with prompt presence of mind, deserving of much commendation he hastened to the Fire Hall and immediately transferred one of the hose reels to the scene of action. In about seventeen minutes from the first sound of the bell, the first water was drawn and the fire was soon under control but not till the shed was nearly demolished. In one end of the shed was a large bin containing five or six hundred bushels of wheat. Though somewhat damaged by the water it need not be looked upon as a total loss, its valve for feeding purposes, having lost but little. The Firemen did remarkably well on this as on other occasions.

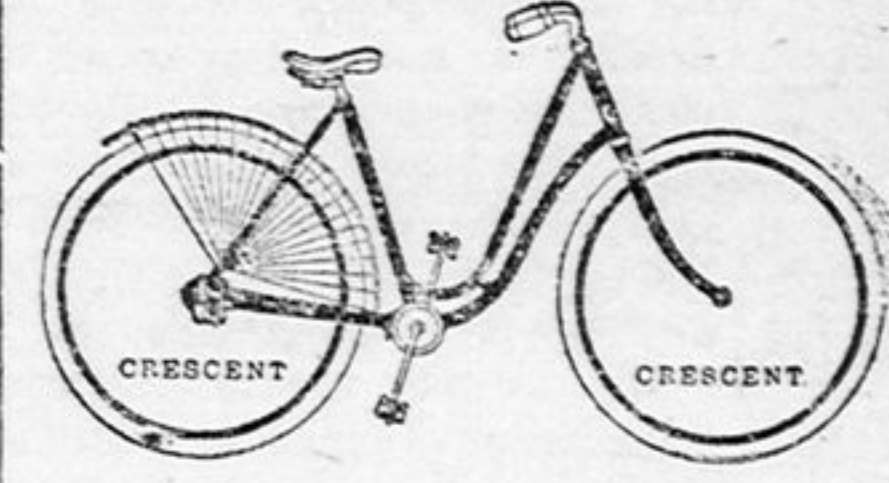

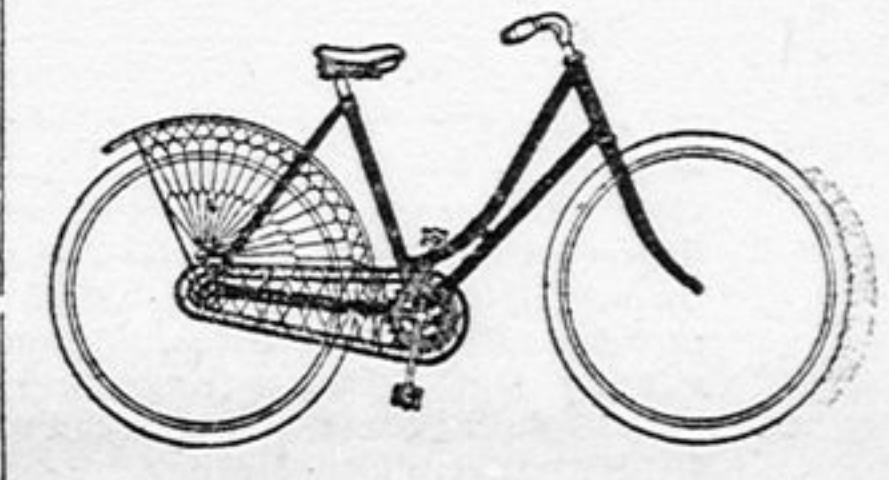
