The Conservatives were extravagant because it cost them 37 million dollars a year to run the government.

In addition to \$46,286,551 asked for in the estimates, the Minister of Finance brought in a bundle of supplementary estimates, asking for \$5,497,344 making the total estimates reach the enormous sum of \$51,783,895.
