The following letter from Mr. M. W. Doherty, of the Ontario Agricultural College, was received in answer to Mr. Gorsline's enquiry about a very rare, but very noxious weed, recently discovered and submitted for identification. Farmers in the vicinity who imported hay two or three years ago had better examine their fields as it must have been admitted in that way. The letter is dated at Guelph, July 11th '99, and reads as follows:

DEAR SIR.—Your specimen addressed to Prof. Hutt was handed to me yesterday. The weed is "Bladder Campion" (Silene Inifata) and is a very bad member. Owing to its great development of root, it is almost impossible to eradicate it in a short time. I would advise you to summer-fallow, plow the weeds under when in flower. Follow with Rape or Buckwheat sowed the following summer about as late as possible. Plow just before sowing the crop. If possible follow the next year with some hoed crop. This is somewhat of a severe treatment, but I think the nature of the weed warrants it.

Durham Boys in Luck.
 The following item clipped from the Border Budget of Koochiching, Minn., will be of local interest:—
 Dr. McKenzie and Albert Bone, of Mine Centre, accompanied by Daniel Simpson, of Buffalo, New York, visited Fort Frances last week to complete the final details for the sale of 779P, 764P and 765P to Buffalo capitalists represented by Mr. Simpson. The deal was completed for a consideration of \$30,000, Dr. McKenzie and Mr. Bone returning to the Mine Centre and Mr. Simpson proceeding to his home in Buffalo, with the deeds for three locations in his pockets.

The property in the question is located on the south side of the Seine River, about six miles above Sturgeon Falls, and has the reputation of being among the best of the gold mining properties in that rich district. It was discovered about five years ago, during the time of the first rush of prospectors and gold seekers to the Seine River district. The principal lead on this property is from 15 to 30 feet in width, the ore from which gives most satisfactory assays and seldom or never fails to show the color in the pan.

We understand that Mr. Simpson has now gone East to complete all arrangements for immediately beginning active development work.
