On Friday evening, in the Baptist Church, and on Sunday afternoon in the Town Hall, Rev. Mr. Jansen delivered two enthusiastic addresses in behalf of the Lord's Day Alliance. On both occasions the audiences were good and listened with interest to the speakers explanation of the aims and objects of the organization. As the address in Flesherston reported at some length in this issue is similar to the ones delivered here, we ask our readers attention to that for information.

ATTACKED BY A ROOSTER.—On Friday last a little child of scarcely two years, daughter of Mr. F. Wise, farmer living near Allan Park, was derailed off to the barnyard and was attacked by a game rooster. When the child was found the rooster was standing over her and striking at her with his spurs. The poor little thing was covered with blood and so exhausted that it could not cry out. She was brought to Hanover and a physician found that the rooster had driven his spurs into her head in several places, one just above one of her eyes—Mail and Empire. Mr. Wise formerly lived on the Woodland Farm near Varney.

The shade trees on the street in front of postmaster MacKenzie's residence were girdled on Friday night or early on Saturday morning last, being the fifth time they were similarly treated during the past two years. A number of ridges in the mutilated bark and wood gave evidence as to the condition of the instrument used. Mrs. MacKenzie swore out a warrant for the arrest and search of Edward Mortley, now a resident of Upper Town. Constables Carson and Whelan made the arrest and search, finding on the person of the accused a large pocket knife so gapped as to correspond with the ridges left in the trees. A preliminary trial was held on Saturday afternoon before Mayor Calder and Magistrate Mockler. Witnesses were heard and gave evidence to show the knife produced or one nicked exactly like it, had been used in doing the deed. Though Mr. Mortley testified to his innocence, the Magistrates felt they had no alternative but to commit him for trial. It was agreed to accept bail for \$500 which was immediately handed over by the accused.
