FLESHERTON.

Mr. and Mrs. P. Quigg met with a sudden and sore bereavement last week by the death of their daughter, Mrs. A. Sherson, who died at her home in Proton on Monday night after a few hours illness. The remains were interred in Flesherton Cemetery on Wednesday, Rev. Mr. Thom officiating, assisted by Rev's. Carlyle and Buchanan. A largely attended memorial service was held in the Presbyterian Church Sunday morning when Mr. Thom preached an appropriate sermon from the text, "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord." Deceased was thirty years of age and was married to her now sorrowing husband about two and a half years ago.

The remains of Mrs. Wm. Lockhart, who fell asleep in the Lord at her home near Proton Station on Wednesday morning last week, were interred in the Flesherton Cemetery on Wednesday afternoon. A funeral service was held at the house, Rev. Mr. Darroch preaching an excellent sermon from Rev. 14:13. The deceased was 69 years of age and a faithful member of the Baptist Church which she attended regularly when her health permitted. Mrs. Thos. Whitten, near Markdale, and Mrs. Edward Whitten, of this place, are daughters of the deceased.

After a lingering illness, borne with Christian resignation and patient waiting, Mrs. Watson, sr., relict of the late Joseph Watson, was, like a sheaf ready for the harvest, garnered to her home above on Wednesday, the 16th inst. On the Friday following her remains were laid at rest in the Mount Zion Cemetery, alongside her husband who preceded her over four years ago. A service was held in Mt. Zion church where her pastor, Mr. Darroch, preached an appropriate sermon from Psa. 116:15, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints." Deceased was over 75 years of age and she too had been for years an esteemed member of the Baptist church in this place. Four sons and three daughters preceded her to the glory land.
