Local News.

Mr. J. A. HUNTER's trotting horse "Black-thorn," took three straight firsts in the three minute trot at Owen Sound, Monday.

ENGAGED.—The Public School Board of Dundalk on Tuesday evening, Aug. 8th, selected teachers for their vacant forms. J. A. Speers, Barrie, who holds a first class professional was first choice for principal at a salary of \$425, and Miss McNeil, Toronto, first choice for Miss Campbell's room at a salary of \$225. Both have accepted. There were about 130 applications.—Herald.

POSTMASTER SINCE 1843.—The Bruce Herald supposed that Mr. Malcolm McLean, of Walkerton, was the oldest postmaster in Canada until it was learned that Mr. Roblin, of Ameliasburg held office there since Jan. 1, 1845. The CHRONICLE is informed, however, that the honor does not belong to either Walkerton or Ameliasburg as Mr. William Buchanan, of Williamsford, was appointed postmaster in 1843 and has held his position continuously ever since. We wait to learn of a former appointment.

The funeral of the late Mr. Jno. Himmler of Neustadt on Thursday afternoon was the largest that has been in that village for years. The remains were laid to rest in the family plot in the village cemetery amid general sorrowing. All his family except one were present at the burial, his son John who lives in Louisiana not being able to reach here in time, decided not to come. Rev. Zoeller performed the final ceremonies.—Aytan Advance. Allow us to add that License Commissioner, Wm. Caldwell, says that Mr. Himmler is the only hotel man in S. Grey that has held a continuous license all through the period of the Crooks Act and that he was also noted for keeping the cleanest house and surroundings in the same license inspector division.

ROBT SCOTT, a tinsmith of Chatsworth, was caught in the act of burglarizing the house of John Lemon of Owen Sound on Thursday morning of last week. A lady visitor heard the footsteps about four o'clock and warned other occupants who immediately proceeded to the room where Scott was operating. After pocketing a valuable gold watch and a wallet containing \$167 the intruder opened the bed room door and tried to force his escape, but running into the arms of Mr. Lemon he was held, though he struggled desperately for his liberty, until assistance came and the police were notified. Scott who is said to feel his position very keenly was remanded till to-day, Thursday, but bail was refused. A. G. MacKay appears in behalf of the Crown, and H. G. Tucker for the prisoner.

Mr. Archie Galbraith, has resigned his position in S. S. No. 10 Bentinck, and will leave next week for Idaho. The work in the School will be taken up by Miss Maggie E. Clark for the balance of the year at least. During his residence in the vicinity, Archie has made himself very popular with the young folks, both ladies and gentlemen, and his ready willingness to render assistance to every thing in the shape of an entertainment will cause the community to regret his departure, however. We trust he will do well and shall be ever pleased to hear of his success, and in so speaking we feel that we voice the sentiment of the whole community. Not only will Mr. Galbraith be missed in the community but the Presbyterian Choir will suffer much loss.

MISS BRACKBILL, who has been laboring as a missionary in China about two thousand miles west of Shanghai, delivered an interesting address on her work there, in the Methodist Church on Sunday evening. Without any effort at oratorical frills, she took the audience with her in an imaginary trip across the Pacific from Vancouver to Shanghai, thence by steamer and "house boats" up the Yang-tse-Kiang to the head of navigation. The filth of Chinese cities, the speaker claimed, shows an entire lack of the knowledge and importance of all sanitary requirements. The cities are surrounded by stone walls, about 40 feet high, perpendicular on the outside, but sloping so that the tops are easily accessible from the inside. Entrance to the cities can be made only through gates, of which there were only four in the city of 600,000 inhabitants where Miss Brackbill labored. The manners and customs of the Chinese were briefly touched, and though a few years ago the Missionaries were driven, out and were forced to leave the city, their return has had a wholesome influence on the population and the dissemination of Gospel teaching seems now to be brighter than ever. The night was very warm, yet the speaker had the rapt attention of a good audience during the whole address.
