DEATH'S HARVEST. Five in One Day Carried off by the Grim Reaper.

POSTMASTER MCKENZIE PASSES PEACEFULLY AWAY AFTER A LINGERING ILLNESS.—WALTER WEBBER DROWNED WHILE TRYING TO RESCUE HIS BROTHER.—AN OLD RESCUEE OF EGREMONT DIES FROM GANGRENE.

ARCHIBALD MCKENZIE. We regret this week to chronicle the death of Mr. Archibald McKenzie, which took place about five o'clock on Friday morning last.

About forty years ago Mr. McKenzie came to this town from Perth in his native County of Lanark, Ont., and thirty-one years ago last Monday week he was appointed postmaster of what was then known as "Beutinek" post office.

Knowing some time ago that the end was not far off he made preparation for the sad event, leaving written instructions to be observed in connection with his burial.

Mr. McKenzie never cared for show and in order that his burial ceremony might be in keeping with the unassuming quiet character of his life, he was specially desirous the funeral should be quiet and that no society, as such, should follow his remains to the grave.

On the 22nd of September 1864, the subject of this sketch was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Boulden, niece of the late Mrs. George Jackson. The result of the union was three children, Laura and Edith at home, and Archie in Buffalo, N. Y., all of whom remain to mourn the loss of a kind husband and indulgent father.

Though it is the wish of the family the newspaper obituary notices be modest and void of anything having the appearance of flattery, we must not be thought to violate their wish if we say that in the official discharge of his duties we never found a more obliging man than Mr. McKenzie, and for this reason, if for no other, we regret his departure and extend our sympathy to the sorrowing and bereaved family.
