Toronto Fair.

After two weeks of Fair time the city of Toronto lies exhausted under a clouded sky. Her citizens are satisfied, as are, in fact, all Canadian cities, for the exhibition of 1899 was greater than ever, and we learned our capabilities as a breeding and stock raising land are as great as ever, and our crops are good, and so we have nothing to fear.

The strangers who came to town in thousands, and who saw the sights and the Exhibition, are gradually returning to their homes. Amongst them were people from across the Atlantic, and from the Southern States, and the Eastern States, and the Western States, all with but one object in view and that was to see the Fair. All day, and almost all night long, they filled the grounds which covered one another on the grounds which covered acres of land. All classes were catered to by the management, and everyone was more than satisfied.

It is an old story to say that the Fair is growing for it has been doing so ever since its inception. The only complaint heard was that of want of accommodation, and the only shadow thrown across the continued success and success was caused by the sudden death of six or eight cattle, the cause of which will be investigated, and when discovered, precluded hereafter if the fault of the authorities, and a few days rain which was not bitterly complained about for it was needed.

The Stock Exhibit was as fine as ever, and of this feature an evening newspaper said, "One feels that it is the exhibition proper; here is no sham, no fake, but an illustration of the application of brains, money and pluck to the real and legitimate business." One has hardly to say that we were all pleased to read that a member of the New York State Board of Agriculture, remarked at the Directors' luncheon that "the Toronto Exhibition, alike in live stock and machinery, was remarkably excellent, and took precedence of any on the continent."

Without doubt the exhibit that was the greatest wonder and freak, by the fact that it was new, was the Mammoth White Ox "Fergus" which weighed 3870 pounds, stands nearly six feet high, eight feet two inches and is twelve feet long. Exhibitions of Marconi's System of Wireless Telegraphy were also a feature of the Fair, to new and old patrons, and an exhibit of X-rays, although an old amusement to many, drew large crowds of people. Those who saw the display of the wonderful kettles of water boiled on a cake of ice were fortunate, as were those who witnessed the submarine mining explosions. Leaving the exhibitions and achievements of the year, you passed to other things that were not on the grounds at former years. Lundy's Ostrich Farm, which is a new industry in Canada, came in for a large share of attention. These are some of the things which were new and made up that branch of the Fair which was of an educational advantage to its patrons. Many other things of this nature were on the grounds but did not command the attention of the general public. A genuine locust tree, said to be the only one ever grown on this continent, caught the eye of the naturalist, it being of the kind produced in the country around the Mediterranean.

The amusement side of the Exposition was without a doubt greater than ever. The Oils of Lisance, the Streets of Cairo, gratified those who visited the Midway. Here you saw Egyptian and Algerian dances, Cuban lady contortionists, Eastern sword fighters and Chinese actors. The lion-tamer, the performing bear, the elephants, camels and pythons. One of the latter nearly 15 feet long escaped one day. Then in Hazenbach's Wild Animal Show you saw a boxing kangaroo, performing jaguars, edged dogs and donkeys, Russian wolves, Danish bloodhounds, and black bears, "Daisy" the tree-climbing Anaconda of Brazil, an exhibition of the great African Lion hunt, and how they train wild animals; the three baby lions born in Toronto; the lion and the lamb lying down together; the fox and the goose in the same cage, and the fat boy and Chiquita, the living doll.

Over in the ring the new feature added to already seen was Ida LeRoy's Balloon Excursions and her being shot out of a cannon and descending by a parachute.

It is after the hands have played "God save the Queen" that one catches some idea of the number of people scattered over the grounds, for it is when they gather just outside of the gates, waiting for cars, jumbled together, continually rounded up by policemen, laughing, yelling, pushing and charging the cars as they slide up, that matters become uncomfortable and dangerous. Some are lifted into the seats, some are pushed back. Many manage to get a foothold on the steps and platform as did Jimmy Williams one night, who as the crowd pressed forward, was pushed off and fell under the wheels of the trailer which passed over his body killing him instantly.

Then the cars started with human freight sitting, standing and hanging on every conceivable space, and slid into the city with a man on front seat telling the people through a horn of things to see, and scattering their freight at every corner.

Down in the city the number of people is very great, all moving about under the influence of a feverish excitement, doing many things which they consider permissible because it is Fair time. There is the male and female going out into the night to prey on their fellow creature, there is the visitor moving along trying to hide an interest in what he sees, and there is the citizen who has left a home to proudly move along the streets and enjoy some of the admiration and awe the visitor shows for his city and his achievements.

At all the principal corners is the man who wants to sell you something for nothing, tooth powder, electric belts, small-wares, razor paste, and a solution that will heal a wound even if it pierces your wrist as he shows you by driving a carving knife through his wrist and holding it up to the astonished crowd, then he withdraws the knife and applied the solution healing the wound instantly.

In a cab sat a clever child actress on her way home after the performance, turning into a side street a man ran out and climbed up behind the vehicle, when the rig stopped and the occupant alighted he tried to seize her, bent on kidnapping the prize, but was prevented from doing so by a bicyclist.

At another corner early in the evening, within the sound of thousands, an Assyrian suddenly saw a knife in his face and heard a demand for his money—he instantly yielded to the demand of the footpad.

On another night a missionary among the gamblers died suddenly; and a boy's body was washed upon the shore near the Exhibition grounds, and during the day a visitor was on the wharf waiting and joking meanwhile for the boat to take him home.
