Flesherston Fair.

The East Grey Agricultural Society held their exhibition at Flesherston on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. In accordance with their usual luck the weather was not so good as one would desire, yet notwithstanding the lowering appearance, the second day, though cold and drizzly, behaved itself fairly well and by noon a goodly number were seen making their way towards the grounds, and the gate receipts at 15c. and 10c. amounted to about \$145.

In some respects the exhibits, though good, were not up to former years. There was some excellent fruit displayed, including apples, pears, plums, etc., and the show of roots was said by one who attended both places to be far ahead of anything shown in London or Toronto.

The ladies work was good, but perhaps not so extensive as in former years.

The poultry show is a growing feature and an increasing interest is being manifested in this department. As at Hanover, our Mr. Moore, of the Durham Poultry Yards, made a clean sweep in prizes for Barded Rocks and Leghorns.

A number of good looking vehicles were exhibited by the Herd Works, of Flesherston, and Mr. Artley, of Markdale, was on hand with pumps, windmills, etc.

The show of cattle was tolerably good and in sheep Mr. Muir of the Durham Road had his usual exhibits.

For amusement the chief interest centered in the Horse racing, supplemented by minor attractions such as the Comfort Soap Race, Bicycle races, Sawing contest, etc.

A number of the old timers were still on hand. Charlie Grant, of Thornbury was there as usual with some of his excellent samples of grain, honey, fruit and so on. The never-failing Robert Ruthven was also present and was a large exhibitor. President Mitchell and Secy. Sproule were busy men all day.
