TRAVELLERS who have been coming to Durham during the past decade are more than pleased with the material progress the town has made during the past two years, a progress once started that is likely to continue for years to come. The new sidewalks constructed last year stood out in such contrast that the old buildings actually looked shabby, and the improvements are sure to go on. We might suggest many things yet, but feeling confident that the people themselves see their necessity we refrain from saying a word.

The Concert given in the Town Hall on Monday evening by Miss Mary Thompson and Mr. Neil Burton, under the auspices of the A.O.U.W., was a fairly successful affair. Mr. N. W. Campbell, as he remarked, took the place of the chair and introduced the entertainers. The rendering of most of the numbers by Miss Thompson were well executed and received encores, while her posing in Greek Costume was hardly up to former performers here. Mr. Burton's impersonation was wide and varied but in "The Irish Courtship" he appeared to best advantage.

The new store, in course of construction by N. G. & J. McKechnie will be a large establishment when completed. The original intention was to have a dwelling up stairs but the idea has been abandoned and the flats are being fitted up for mercantile purposes. An ordinary mortal would think it would require an immense amount of stock to fill it but the Messrs. McKechnie, tell us they have enough already packed in the old store to fill both flats. One could scarcely believe this to be true but we have little doubt that the goods now stored in every conceivable corner will require a large amount of shelving for proper display. The building is 100 ft. long 24 wide.
