**In The Grit Camp.**

The Liberal Convention of the South Riding of Grey was held here on Friday last. The attendance was somewhat slim compared with other years but a number of causes may be given for the meagre gathering.

The following officers were elected:—H. H. Miller, Hanover, President; Robt Morice, First Vice-President; Walter Hastie, Second Vice-President; Chas. Ramage, Secy. Treas. The following is the Executive:—Durham, J. W. Crawford, Bentinck, Geo. Ries, Normandy, Archie Burnett, Artemesia, Thos. Grainger, Markdale, P. McCullough, Dundalk, J. D. Morgan, Hanover, Thomas Poehlman, Auditors—W. Calder, J. W. Crawford.

and elsewhere he denied being as bad as represented. He claimed that there wasn't a charge proved against the party in Waterloo to justify the unseating of Mr. Breithaupt and regretted the judges, who were only human and not infallible, should have so ordered the decision. In conclusion Mr. O'Connor expressed it as his opinion that should the government go to the electors "nothing short of a miracle would keep them from sweeping the country."

Mr. Walter Hastie was called but did not wish to occupy the time and declined giving an address.

Mr. Campbell, of Toronto Junction, M. P. for Kent was the next speaker and expressed the great pleasure he felt to do honor to Dr. Landerkin who he said was respected by both sides of the House and would be much missed. After referring to the growth of Liberalism from ocean to ocean in the Local Legislatures, and the usual quota of reference to corruption he went on to show what the Liberal party under Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and his following of "strong clean, honest, straightforward men," during the past three years had done. He referred to the Manitoba school question as having been "settled in six months in such a manner as to receive the unanimous support of all portions of the Dominion." An attempt was made to justify the action of the government on the Intercolonial Railway, Crows Nest Road and Yukon Railway Deal, and stated as his opinion that the Senate did an incalculable injury in throwing out the Yukon Bill. Mr. Laurier received a large share of praise for his wise choice of the Cabinet and the virtues of Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon. Wm. Mulock and others were held up as models of wise statesmen. He repudiated the charges made by the Tories that the Liberals had stolen their old clothes. The Tariff reductions he said would make an annual reduction of three million dollars.
