ON THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT, ETC.

Toronto. The telegraph companies gave the men the full use of their wires while in Canada. Local publishing firms presented the men with a library of novels and Kipling books, and writing material, and stationery. Perched on poles, posts, fences, and in trees, and windows were faces beaming with sympathy and admiration, and a fond side of their loved ones in the road. Flags fluttered, bells rang and bands played. At twenty minutes after 4 the men reached the Union Depot where they found the special C. P. R. train of 4 tourist sleepers, the palace sleeper Katakadin and the dining car Miramad waiting. Here the leading regiments opened up, and the Transvaal troops marched through into the depot, and then the widest disorder prevailed. No. 2 track upon which the special stood is the other side of large iron gates through which admittance is only gained by showing ones ticket. On this day the rule was to be observed that the people could not get any closer to the train and the boys than 25 feet. So many bought tickets to near towns so as to get through the gates. But when the Toronto unit passed through there was also a solid mass of excited humanity behind and the gates were torn off, and the police pushed to one side. The bridges over the tracks were instantly coated with people, and the cars covered with relations and friends of the boys who did not know but that they looked upon them for the last time. It was the grandest sight one could see, the men offering their lives for their country and their country offering her youth to the land she is child of, all the outcome of the best and highest possible emotion that warms the human breast.

Mrs. John McDonald, of this place, is on the sick list. We hope to hear of her speedy recovery.

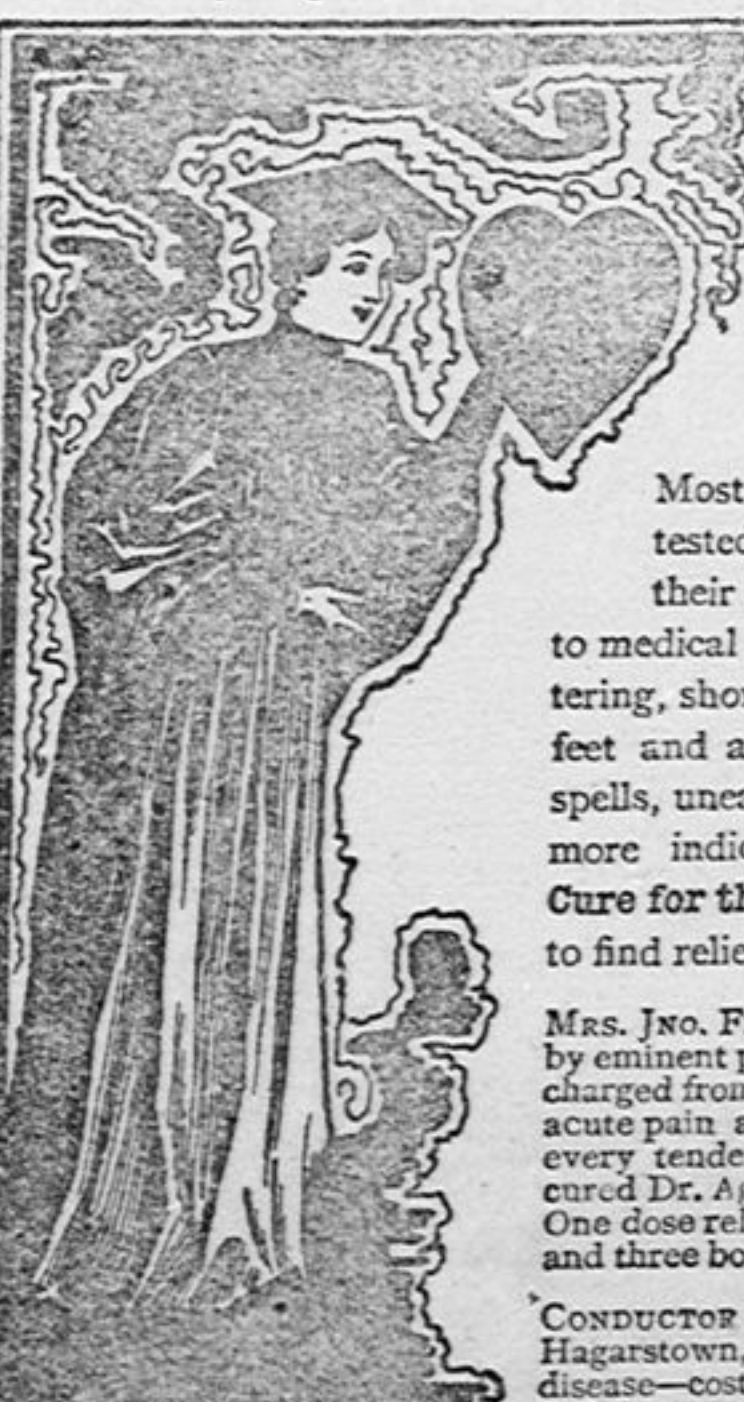

Trespassers Beware.

A Glenelg Farmer complains of Trespassers, and in order to put such on their guard we quote the following from the Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1897, page 1127:—
1. Any person who unlawfully enters into, trespasses upon any land or premises whatsoever, being wholly enclosed, and being the property of another person, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$10.00 for any such offence, irrespective of any damage having or not having been occasioned thereby; and such penalty may be recovered, with costs, in every case, or who shall decide the matter in a summary way, and award costs in case of conviction, which may be had either on view or on confession of the party complained against, or on the oath of one credible witness; but nothing herein contained shall extend to any case where the party complained acted under a fair and reasonable supposition that he had a right to do the act complained of or to any case within the meaning of section 511 of THE CRIMINAL CODE OF 1892."
