Principal Dawson, of McGill College Montreal died last week.

In the Battle at Gras Pan fourteen were killed and eighty-nine wounded.

A Cape Town despatch on Nov. 27th says, "It is reported that General Mathuen has captured Honey Nest Kloof, ten miles north of Gras Pan and two million rounds of ammunition."

The Boer War is getting more interesting as the British forces are landing and being concentrated for action. On Thursday last a fierce conflict took place at Belmont, General Mathuen's forces being obstructed on their way to Kimberley by a determined Boer army.

Continuing his March to Kimberley Mathuen's army met and again defeated a Boer force at Gras Pan ten miles north of Belmont on the railway line to Kimberley. Though the Boer army manifested the same dogged determination as before the result is reported as a complete British success.

Of Mathuen's victory near Gras Pan the associated press despatch says:—"Early in the action 500 Boers attacked our rear guard the brigade met this, and also protected the flanks. The Naval Brigade acted with great gallantry and suffered heavily, but no particulars are yet known. The enemy showed great stubbornness and must have suffered greatly. Twenty were buried. It is known that 31 were killed and 48 wounded. More than 50 horses were found dead in one place. One of our batteries fired five hundred rounds. Our forces must halt one day at Gras Pan to rest and replenish ammunition. The force worked splendidly, and is prepared to overcome any difficulty."

Since we wrote last the New R. C. Cemetery has been quite noticeably improved by a durable looking fence of the Cyclone pattern. A shed has also been erected near the church and is nearly completed. While Mr. Keating the church caretaker planted a number of posts and run a wire cable through them to be used as a tying place for horses.

Mr. C. J. McPherson P. M. at Bell's Corners Egremont spent a day or two visiting friends in this vicinity. He is looking well. The nice young man with the auburn hair has less anxiety for his pet dear now that those two good looking hunters are about a hundred miles away. Thomas A. son of Geo. E. Arrowsmith received a severe blow on the leg below the knee from the front foot of a horse. It is supposed that the bone is fractured as he suffered severe pain for a time but is soon better now.

Killarney is becoming a popular shrine with cyclists. At Belfast, on the 22nd ult., Chief Baron Pallas sentenced ten prisoners, convicted of riot on June 5th, to 12 months' hard labour, and put them under rule of bail for five months; 20 were sent to jail for six months, with hard labour, and placed under the same bail; while other prisoners, with one or two exceptions, in which the cases were adjourned, were acquitted. A farmer named John Sloss, who resided in the townland of Liskettle, died at the advanced age of 104 years. The deceased was fully 6 feet 2 inches in height, of powerful physique, and during all his life was possessed of excellent health. Up to the last he was in full possession of all his mental faculties, and in March last came into town and recorded his vote at the County Council elections.
