COUNTY COUNCIL.

The December session of the county council opened at 7 o'clock Monday evening in the court house. Promptly at the hour Warden Gordon took the chair and asked the clerk to call the roll. All the members answered to their names except Mr. McColeman, who dropped in during the reading of the minutes.

The warden prefaced the regular business with a few remarks appropriate to the occasion, welcoming the members, congratulating them upon the year of prosperity the county in common with the rest of the country had enjoyed.

TUESDAY MORNING.

The council again got down to business at 10 a. m., with the Warden in the chair, and all the members present.

After the minutes of the last meeting had been confirmed the warden read a big batch of small accounts which were referred to the proper committees. Among these were a statement of the cost of crib work done on the county line of Grey and Bruce north of Hanover, amounting to \$273.13, of which this county is responsible for half, and an account from the Hamilton Bridge Company amounting to \$42 for the steel bridge over the Pottawatamie river.

Mr. Watson presented a report from the Education Committees dealing with the matter.

from the treasurer of Keppel of \$53.15 for examination and conveying lunatics to the asylum; and from R. McDowall \$103.50 for survey, plan and inspection for the steel bridge over Pottawatamie river.

The rules of order of business were then suspended, and Provincial Road Inspector Campbell, who was present, was invited to address the council. At the conclusion of his address a neatly expressed vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. Richardson seconded by Mr. Frost and carried by a standing vote. Mr. Campbell suitably acknowledged the courtesy.

The council has adjourned until 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

At 3 p. m. Warden Gordon took the chair and called the members to order.

Accounts amounting in all to \$82.90 were received from Commissioners Allan, Schenk Brown, Brigham and Paterson for inspecting and letting bridge contracts. The other accounts were small and for incidental or printing expenses.

Mr. Preston reported for the finance committee recommending (1) the payment of the following accounts: John McDonald, county property, \$7; Owen Sound, rent of town hall for June sessions \$23; Clerk of the Peace, scrubbing rooms \$2; express charges 35 cents; Copp Clark & Co., jurors books \$8.50; R. J. Edgar \$3.25; Parker & Co., 85 cents; T. R. Weir \$1.75; freight charges \$2.02. The report also recommended that the warden issue his order for \$150 to be deposited in the bank as a special stationery account, and reported that stationery had been distributed among the various officials as follows: sheriff \$2.48; jailor \$4.35; judges chambers \$11.49; clerk of the surrogate courts \$54.03; clerk of the peace \$19.10; county clerk \$4.31; county auditors \$3.08; and county treasurer \$5.43.

The report was adopted without objection being raised.

Mr. McKinnon presented a report from the road bridge committee recommending the payment of the following accounts: T. R. Fawcett building the bridge town line of Collingwood and Euphrasia, \$160; repairing bridge town line St. Vincent and Euphrasia \$68; Jno. Lobsinger, cedar to cover bridge on county line between Grey and Bruce, half share \$3.75; L. Pfeffer building crib of bridge north of Hanover on county line, half share \$132; bolts 15 cents; and James Lockie, inspecting and plan, \$1.82; James Green repairing approaches of steel bridges north of Hanover on county line 75 cents and repairing wooden bridge 50 cents; H. Brigham lumber for bridge on county line north of Hanover \$6.30; F. Heimbecker repairing bridge \$3.15; John Morrison repairing on town line of Holland and Glenelg \$10; Robert Crawford repairing bridge on county line between Grey and Bruce \$67.50; town of Thornbury, repairing bridge, \$13.10; Jas. Arthurs repairing bridges on county line between Grey and Wellington \$31.50; Robert Eden covering bridge on township line between Egremont and Normanby \$25; D. Allisday, repairing bridge on boundary line between Grey and Wellington \$8.75; Alex. McMillan repairing bridge on town line between Holland and Glenelg \$144.35; John McCann, repairing bridge on town line between Holland and Glenelg \$4; and Thos. Willisroft, \$14.50 and Chas. McKinnon \$15 inspecting bridges on town line between Holland and Glenelg. The committee recommended that action in the matter of confirming by-law 5 of the township of Derby closing the original road allowance between lots 15 and 16 concessions 9-10 be deferred
