A STEEL-CLAD RAM WILL BE FIT-TED WITH SHARP SAWS.

Petroleum Will Be Used as the Fuel for the New Craft, Which Will Have But a Moderate Speed.

A new plan has been devised by an English inventor for cutting a pathway through the ice barrier that guards the North Pole. It is an ice orusher that is to be attached to the prow of a steam vessel and to be used Gentlemen: for cutting through the ice just as a drilling machine carves a passage through rocks.

The idea originated with Mr. Warrington Baden-Powell, elder brother of Sir George Baden-Powell, M.P., and Colonel Baden-Powell, who is now mak-Boers in Mafeking. The ice-crushing craft will resemble the ocean whaleback. The deck covering is to be of steel, studded with heavy rivets, the whole welded to stand extreme temperature such as would be met with in the Polar regions.

The rapidly revolving screw and ram combined will first crush into the ice, impelled by tremendous power. It will then saw and bore its way through the pack floe, throwing the ice upward and backward. In order that the flying ice may not injure the ressel, a shield has been constructed which will answer the dual purpose of withstanding the heavy shocks of the waves and the bombardment of the flying ice.

When built for moderate speed only, this craft is especially designed for battering and ramming ice, and its propelling engines, which are to be compound triple expansion, will be of fully' 1,500 horse-power.
