An unconfirmed report from Pietermaritzburg, says Lord Dunderdale entered Ladysmith with 1600 men.

The report of British losses on Sunday gives 6 killed, 78 wounded and 8 missing. A report from Spearman's Camp, dated January 21st tells of a stubborn fight from dawn to dark in which the British slowly gained ground.

War news is very meagre, and though General Buller is advancing towards Ladysmith his progress is slow. The Boers are strongly entrenched, and the few casualties in the British ranks show that they exercise greater watchfulness, and have to some degree adapted Boer tactics in fighting under cover.
