CONVULSIONS.

The nervous system of infants is much more irritable than that of older people; that is to say, it is excited to undue action by various stimulants which in the older child or the adult would have no similar effect. For example, many fevers begin in adults with a chill, but in infants with a convulsion. It is this fact that makes spasms so common, and for the most part of comparatively so little signifiance, in babies.

After the second or third year the nervous system acquires more equilibrium, and then a convulsion is a more serious matter, and indicates the probable existence of some nervous disease in the child.
