BENINCCK COUNCIL.

Council met at the Royal Hotel, Elmwood on Monday the 12th Feb. Members at present, minutes of January meeting read and confirmed.

The committee appointed at last session on Treasurer's surties reported them good and satisfactory. The Auditors' report for the year '99 was received and passed and 200 copies ordered to be printed.

The Reeve reported that at the request of the County Council he had attended a meeting of the reeves of county at Owen Sound on the 25th of last month to consider the improvement of roads in the county. Report ordered to be received and the Reeve's expenses of \$4 to be paid.

Applications for the office of assessor received from Robert Brigham and Neil McCallum. Mr. Brigham was appointed. Salary \$60.

Tenders for printing received from the Review, Chronicle, Enterprise and Post. The tender of the Post of \$75 for printing and advertising was accepted.

The road commissioners were instructed to cause pathmasters to have all stones removed from the road bed when performing stature labor, also before putting on gravel to have the road well rounded in centre of a uniform width, say from 18 to not more than 22 feet from back of grade, and that no pathmaster be allowed to purchase gravel without the consent of the commissioner of his division.

The Reeve and Councillors Brown and Adlam were appointed a committee to meet at Hanover on Friday next, the 16th inst with a committee from the Board Council re Crispin's Bridge and the Hanover committee re settlement of finances.

The account of Municipal World \$2 65 for Assessor's stationary paid Fred Riechan was refunded \$2 95 error in his assessment. The Treasurer was paid his salary of \$100 for the past year. Indigents Smith, Pike, Finnelly and Fossit were ordered to be paid their second quarterly allowance of \$8 each.

By-laws Nos. 2 and 3 appointing assessors, pathmasters poundkeepers and fenceviewers, having been duly read were ordered to be passed signed and sealed.

Council adjourned to meet at Allan Park on the 28th of May next for general business and as a Court of Revision.

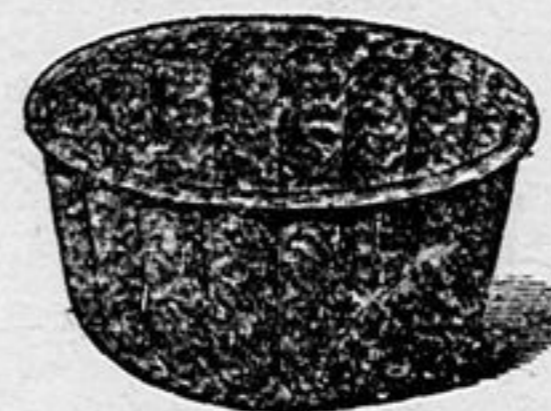
