My DEAR FATHER, -- We are still in the same old barracks and likely to stay for some time. I think. We are doing a lot of "hiking" around the foot hills and are beginning to be quite successful. The Presidiente and Lieniente, of Mingoniela, who were implicated in the attack on M Company a week or so ago, were sentenced to one year at hard labor in the military prison here. There are about fifty prisoners there now, grounds around Cebu.

The other night, Friday, Lieut. Hadsell and ten of us, with two noncommissioned officers went out about a mile to reconnoitre. Our guide, Antonio, learnt the insurgent Generals were in the habit of coming to Cebu and attending dances and festivities on the outskirts of the town. Juan, out with us. We got out so quietly that none of the natives knew main road at some distance from the quarters. We then formed a skirmish smashed him on the head with the table striped dress. butt of his pistol. He staggered back and fell in the road but speedily recovered. After waiting a short time we came back to our quarters. The last man turned out to be a badly scared "Amigo" and was turned loose.
