T. O. STEWART SUICIDES.

Thomas Stewart yesterday put an end to his life by means of laudanum. He was filty years of age, a victim of the liquor habit, and his health had not been particularly good during the past few years. A refusal on the part of his parents to longer tolerate and humor him in his dissipated carreer induced him to do away with himself. Stewart lived with his wife, a hard working, industrious woman, in a cottage in the rear of 80 Agnes street. Of late he had been writing letters to his mother in Peterboro', asking assistance from her, and begging to be allowed to go down there to live. He sent one of these letters a few days ago, and received a reply yesterday morning. He tore it up as soon as he read it. Then he sat down and wrote

to his mother as follows :-"DEAR MOTHER,-I received your letter to-day. I asked to come and MACFARLANE'S STORE Oa see you, and you said no. Well, 1 have two ounces of laudanum. want to hear from you. If not I will be gone, and good riddance to me. I am tired of life. This is the last letter. Good bye, old mother. I am sorry to disgrace you, but I cannot help it. T. S." On the other side of


