

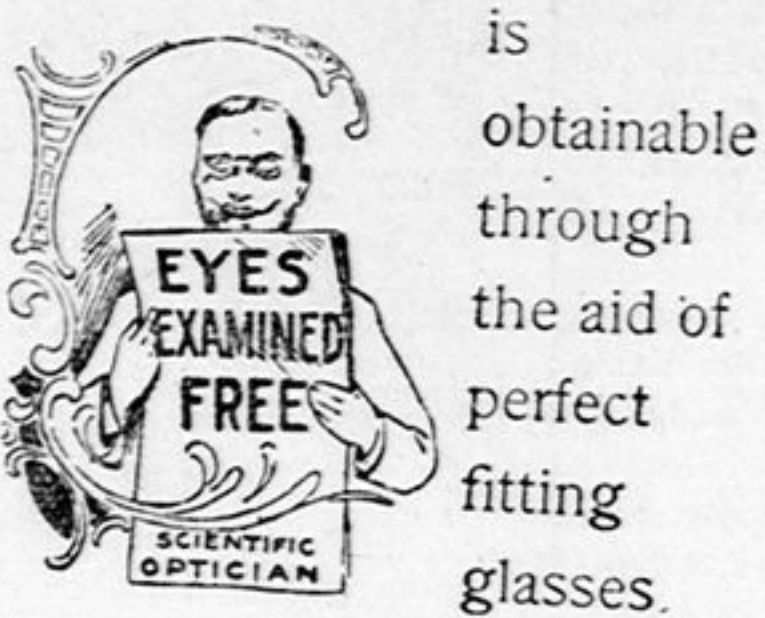

 Commissioner Hastie reported on road improvements. To James F. Durrant, gravelling at Lot 19, Con. 15-16, 21 rods, 5 ft wide. Siches' deep; also removing rough logs in crossway cost \$15. John Adams, repairing bridge at Lot 12, Con. 15-16 cost \$2; H. Haw repairing culvert at 20th sideroad, Con. 18-19 cost \$1. Payment recommended.
 McQueen—McIntyre—That Commissioner Hastie's report be adopted, and orders granted. Com's fee \$2.—Carried.
 Com'r McQueen reported a new culvert at Lot 27, Con. 5-6, 2ft x 4ft clear, 16 ft long by George Belton cost \$9; also clearing out water course same place \$3; repairing culvert at Lot 25, Con. 5-6 cost \$1; two new middle beams in Drewry's bridge \$12.75. To James Cook a new stringer 55 feet long in Drewry's bridge cost \$25. To James Drewry, work on Davidson's bridge, base line, \$8. To Eugene Murphy, elm plank covering Davidson's bridge, \$9.71. Payment recommended.
 McIntyre—Hastie—That foregoing report be adopted, orders granted, and that the Commissioner receive \$3 fees.—Carried.
 Commissioner McIntyre reported a new log in bridge at Lot 11, Con. 15-16, 21 rods, cost 75 cents; Jas. Baird, filling sink holes on hills on townline at lots 1-2, con. 3, cost \$14. Egremont's share \$7; Jas. Matthews repairing broken bridge at lot 1, con. 2, cost \$7.50; Egremont's share \$3.75; Jos. Campbell, gravelling 25 rods, 5 ft. wide, 8 inches deep, at 55 cts. a rod, cost \$2.75; Building two culverts at lots 25-26, con. 22, cost \$10; rep. road on townline \$12. Egremont's share \$6; payment recommended.
 Robb—McQueen—That foregoing report be adopted, orders granted, and Com'r receive \$4 fees. Carried.
 Com'r Robb reported repairing culvert at Laban Gray's, O. S. R., by Chas Hunt, cost \$4. Egremont's share \$2.37. To A. Piet-over, filling in landside at 10th sideroad, cost \$4, allowed 2 day's work for 2 men and 1 team gravelling at \$4 per day. John Hunter, putting 3 planks in Raven's bridge, cost \$1.50. E. McEachern, a culvert lot 13, con. 10, cost \$6.50. Payment recommended.

 The Reeve reported repairing culvert on sideroad by A. Hamilton, cost \$1.25; Geo. Klemp, rep. Holstein bridge, cost 50 cts, payment recommended.
 McIntyre—Robb—That reeve's report be adopted and orders granted.—Carried.
 Hastie—Robb—That the clerk communicate with Proton Council again, calling attention as to furnishing a proper outlet for water at townline Proton and Egremont in filling ditch on townline, con. 7, and advise this Council as speedily as possible as to what action they propose to take regarding these matters.—Carried.
 Hastie—McIntyre—That Messrs. Dickson and Robb be paid the sum of \$1 each, for conveying with Com'r McQueen re Drewry's bridge.—Carried.
 Resolved that no action be taken in Jos. Campbell's and D. Ferguson's case.—Carried.
 Com'r McIntyre reported that having interviewed the Com'r of Glenelg regarding the road at Grassy's pond, recommended that no action be taken at present.
 Hastie—McQueen—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r receive 75 cents fees.—Carried.
 McQueen—Hastie—That before passing By-law re Pinder's cattle-pass, the clerk prepare an agreement and have it signed and registered against his land as security for the municipality. Carried.
 Geo. Klemp, road com'r, Holstein, gave a detailed statement of expenditure upon sidewalks, amounting to \$28.78.
 Hastie McIntyre—That report of Com'r of Holstein be adopted, and an order be granted for said amount.—Carried.
