Rodney, Oct. 8.—B. Osterhout, Principal of the Rodney Public School, committed suicide this morning about 9 o'clock by cutting his throat with a razor, and died ten minutes after. Mr. Osterhout had been sick for a few days, but under Dr. Darland's treatment his condition improved, and on Saturday he went to the residence of his brother-in-law Mr. Peter McVicar, near Wardsville, where he committed the deed. He came here from Wabash, near Thamesville, and had only been teaching since the summer holidays, succeeding Mr. Wallis. A short time ago he had a severe illness, which left him in a weak condition, and, having some trouble in his school last week, it is supposed his mind was not in proper condition to stand the strain of worry and work, as he had not fully recovered from his former illness.
