Priceville Exhibition.

Good Show. Good Weather. Good Attendance.

The Artemesia Agricultural societies' annual Exhibition, held on Thursday and Friday of last week, is pronounced by competent judges and knowing visitors to be the best in the annals of the show, both in the character of the exhibits and the number of visitors, who availed themselves of the regular annual outing. The exhibits in grain, roots, vegetables and ladies work were, we believe, the best we witnessed this year. The carriage works of Heard & Sons, Flesherston, and Dan McTavish, of the same place, were well to the front, each having on the grounds magnificent waggons, sleighs and buggies, all of home manufacture, and equal in style and finish to anything to be found anywhere. The show in cattle, sheep and pigs, too, was pronounced good. The weather was all that could be desired, genuine balmy show days, neither too hot nor too cold, a feature of the fair differing somewhat from that of previous years when the weather was not favorable for pleasure seekers and sight-seers. The attendance was unusually large, and the gate receipts must have been ahead of any previous year. Secretary Brodie and J. I. Graham are still to the front as exhibitors in fruit and grain as will be seen by the frequency of their names as they appear in the prize list. Messrs. Alex. and Peter Muir and Mr. W. Meads are evidently the sheep raisers of the township and had good displays.

The concert in the evening, though we did not see it, is pronounced good, and listened to by a packed house which will also aid in swelling the coffers of the society.

Mr. M. Richardson and Dr. Landarkin, as well as a number of aspirants for the honors of the County Commissionership, were among the hand shakers at the fair.
