JOHN CHARLTON RE-ELECTED

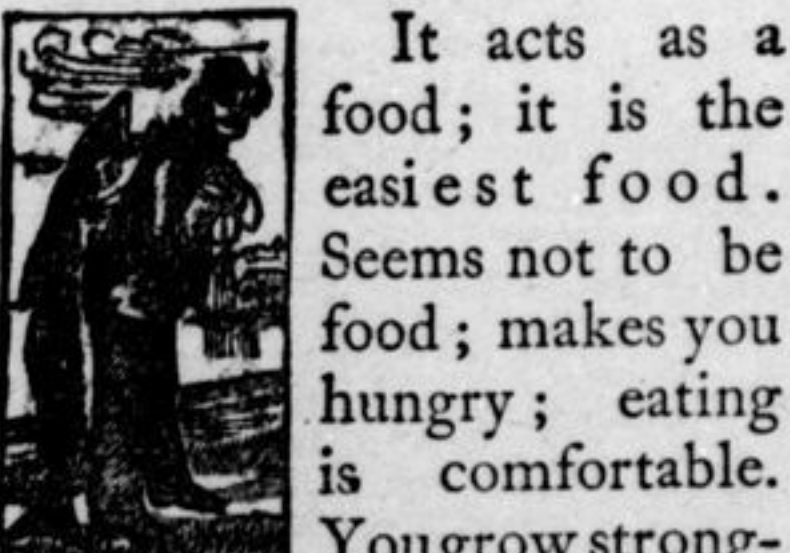
Tilsonburg, Ont. Nov. 2.—W. A. Charlton's popularity and political ingenuity prevents North Norfolk enjoying the excitement of a political battle. Yesterday, along with some thirty representative Liberals, including President Kitchen, of the Reform Association; E. C. Carpenter, M. P. P.; G. W. Wells, Q. C.; and T. G. Slaght, Simcoe, he came to this town and succeeded in persuading J. C. Ross, who had been nominated the previous day as a straight supporter of the Laurier administration, to retire. Mr. John Charlton, as a result is elected by acclamation. At the conference Mr. Ross was impressed with the injurious effect a contest between Liberals would have on T. R. Atkinson's prospects in South Norfolk, and on the candidates in the next Local election. These arguments weakened Mr. Ross's determination to contest the riding, but before he consented to withdraw, his supporters, who are influential Liberals, forced John Charlton to pledge his support to the Laurier Government in carrying out the policy of the party.
