The fact of Sir Wilfrid Laurier being a Frenchman, would naturally win for him a large support from his own race, independent of a feeling of loyality or otherwise towards the British Crown. In some instances of course the majorities were large in support of the Liberal Candidate, but on the other hand a comparison of results shows in many cases a much reduced majority of Liberal Candidates over the majorities taken in 1896. This being the case, and an investigation and comparison wil show it to be so, we believe personal ly that it is unwise to work up a feeling in Ontario and the English speaking constituencies of the Dominion against the French portion of our population.
