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MR. M. RICHARDSON.

How Respected by Those Who Know Him Best.

At the close of a reception accorded Mr. Richardson on Thursday evening, Nov. 8th, the Flesherston Advance gives the following outline of what some of the speakers said about him:—

Mr. J. W. Frost, of Owen Sound gave a rattling good speech. He had taken an active part on the other side in North Grey, but was glad to add his testimony to Mr. Richardson's personal worth. He had been associated with him in county council and that body had placed the highest honor on him that it was possible to do.

It was men of Mr. Richardson's character, business ability and integrity that we required in parliament to attend to our interests. In looking at the complete returns we find that there are severe losses on both sides. Tupper, Foster, Montague, and McDonald were leaders who had ceased to represent the people. On the other hand many representative Reformers had been beaten, especially in Ontario. He was glad, of course, that the government had been sustained, and he thought many Conservatives took the same view, while there were causes for congratulations on both sides. It was a somewhat serious matter to undertake political life. There were sacrifices to be made. A gentleman in public life had told him he would never advise a young man to undertake it. Of course circumstances varied, but as a rule this held good. The interests of the country required the best brain power obtainable. Mr. Frost then went on to eulogize this great Dominion, this wonderful country, as he expressed it. Our trade, he stated, amounts to \$1,000,000 per day. Our country was becoming imperial and had grown in the estimation of European countries, who now understand that there is a Canada, whereas a few years ago they did not. Whether we were Conservatives or Reformers a duty devolved upon us. We had the best form of government in the world, with protection of the mother country, and all we paid for the latter was the paltry sum paid to the Governor General. We should endeavor to work out our destiny and help the government to make one great empire under the flag of England. Mr. Frost's remarks were received with rousing cheers.

Young Mr. Doherty, of Durham, had a bad croak in his voice, and could not say much, but told a little story and was excused from making a speech owing to the impediment resulting from too much cheering in the night air.

Mr. James McMullen was proud of South Grey and more so of Mr. Richardson. If we had more men like Mr. Richardson our politics would be pure. He had voted for Dr. Landerkin more than once, but thought our present member was the right man in the right place.

Mr. Jos. Blakely had known Mr. Richardson since he was a little boy and in all that time had never known him to do a mean thing. He was not a prejudiced man, and had it been possible to do so Mr. Blakely would have liked to have given Mr. Richardson a half dozen votes. The position had sought Mr. Richardson and he thought the gentleman capable of becoming premier.

Mr. Malcolm Beaton, a straight Reformer, was pleased at the result. He thought the Conservatives could not have all the credit for electing the present representative. He thought it was "We Grits" who elected him. He was glad of the result and thought Mr. Richardson would legislate for the best interest of the country.

Mr. J. W. Boyd esteemed it a privilege to say a few words. He was not in the best of form, being afflicted with a touch of the "Durham sore throat." He had been over to Duronto celebrate and said the enthusiasm which had made the welkin ring over there, was beyond describing.

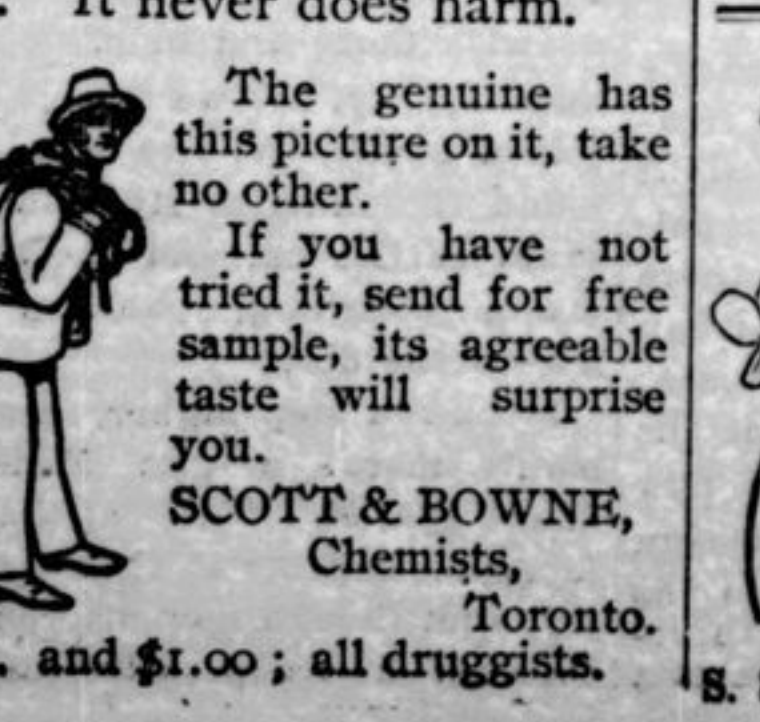
