THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

MEETING OF THIS AUGUST BODY YESTERDAY.

Warden McDonald's Address - Improvements Noted - Mr. Richardson, M. P., Congratulated - Notes.

The Grey County Council met here yesterday for the final session of 1900. Those present were Warden McDonald in the chair and Messrs. Charles Gordon, J. W. Frost, Wm. A. Totten, Jos. Pringle, Henry Brigham, M. Richardson, Geo. Watson, T. B. Preston, Neil McColman, A. C. Paterson, Geo. A. Brown, and Thomas Willisroft.

The address was received with every evidence of approval and the Council then proceeded to routine business. A large number of communications, petitions, memorials and accounts were read and referred to the respective committees.

One Communication, a letter from Messrs. Lucas, Wright & McArdle,

barristers, asked that two of their clients, Messrs. Arthur Wiggins and Andrew Love, be reimbursed for damages sustained last summer by reason of the defective condition of the bridge and approaches at the Saugeen river on the boundary line between Markdale and Glenelg.

Petitions for a number of changes in the school sections in Proton were also among the letters read. An order was presented dealing with the attachment of the village of Hanover to Grey County, together with some correspondence connected therewith.

There being no other business before the Council an adjournment was made until 10 a. m. to-day, and in the meantime the various committees met and prepared reports on the matters referred to them.

TUESDAY MORNING.

Council met at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning; members all present; the warden in the chair. Minutes of Monday's session were read and confirmed. The warden read the following documents and referred them to the several standing committees for report.

Mr. Preston, chairman of Finance, presented report No. 1 of Finance. This report recommended the payment of two accounts connected with the incorporation of Hanover village.

The address was received with every evidence of approval and the Council then proceeded to routine business. A large number of communications, petitions, memorials and accounts were read and referred to the respective committees.

Report No. 1 of County Property was presented by Mr. Totten and was adopted without amendment. This report recommended the payment of sundry accounts, which had been referred to them at former meetings, mostly for repairs and

supplying material for same to county buildings. It also confirmed the payment of accounts for building the verandah at the Court House; repairing roof of gaoler's residence; coal supply; construction of the granolithic walks from Bay street to the Court House and gaoler's residence; superintendence of work; furnishing plans for verandah and walks, etc.

Council adjourned till 2 o'clock Thursday p. m. The proceedings yesterday were largely routine.
