Of Interest to Farmers. Mr. G. C. Creelman, Superintendent of Farmers' Institutes, has completed arrangements for the holding of over 500 meetings during the coming months of December, January and February.

Besides the regular topics there are three special subjects that will receive attention this winter and the following instructions have been issued to the delegates by the Superintendent:—

Last winter, at the request of the Prov. Minister of Agriculture, the "Bacon Hog" was discussed at all our meetings.

The Registrar of Live Stock for the Province states that for the first time the bacon breeders and the number of thoroughbred animals registered and weeding enquiries from all parts of the Province in reference to the breeding, feeding and finishing of this class of animals.

Much has already been done to our progressive swine breeders to improve the bacon classes and it was a notable feature of our fair this year that in all classes of hogs there were longer individual animals and the judges gave the highest premiums to those animals that showed the least indication of carrying superfluous fat.

The subject of cold storage for farm produce will be discussed this winter at our meetings. You must be prepared to discuss this question. New laws have been passed in Ontario relating to this subject and these you should familiarize yourself with.

Another industry that is deserving of more attention than it receives, and which the Hon. Minister of Agriculture is anxious to promote, is that of Poultry Raising and Fatting for the Home and Foreign Markets.
