Bylaw No. 381.

A By-law to raise the sum of \$7,000 for the building, erecting, constructing and maintaining of a Town Hall in the Town of Durham:

Whereas it is deemed necessary and expedient to build and erect a Town Hall in the Town of Durham:

And whereas the estimated cost of the said Town Hall is the sum of \$7,000 which sum it is necessary to raise for the purposes aforesaid, and in order thereto, it will be necessary to issue Debentures of the Corporation of the Town of Durham as hereinafter provided:

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the said principal sum of \$7,000 so to be borrowed by the said Corporation shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent, per annum payable yearly; and that the said principal sum shall be made payable in twenty annual instalments in the twenty years next ensuing, after the taking effect of this By-law, and that such instalments shall be of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period:

And whereas it will be requisite to raise the several sums in each year respectively set forth in clause numbered two of this By-law for paying the said debt and interest, which said sums amount to the annual sum of \$515.07 to be raised in each and every year during the term of twenty years:

And whereas the value of the whole rateable property of the said Corporation, according to the last revised Assessment Roll being that of the year 1900 amounts to the sum of \$315,419:

And whereas the present existing debt of the said Corporation, amounts to the sum of \$83,891 and no part of the principal or interest is in arrear:

And whereas it is deemed necessary, and expedient with the assent of the electors of the said Town of Durham to build, erect, and construct the said Town Hall and to borrow and expend the said sum of \$7,000 in the manner and for the purposes aforesaid:

Now therefore the Municipal Council of the said Corporation of the Town of Durham enacts as follows:

Table with 4 columns: YEAR, PRINCIPAL, INTEREST, TOTAL. Rows from 1902 to 1921, plus a Totals row.

3. The said Debentures as to principal and interest shall be paid at the Standard Bank of Canada, in the said Town of Durham:

4. That it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Corporation, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to sign and issue the said Debentures, hereby authorized to be issued, and to cause the same, and the interest coupons attached thereto, to be signed by the Treasurer of the said Corporation, and the Clerk of the said Corporation is hereby authorized and instructed to attach the seal of the said Corporation to the said Debentures:

5. That there shall be levied and raised in each year by a special rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable property, in the said Town of Durham, the sum of \$515.07 being a sum sufficient to discharge the several instalments of principal and interest accruing due on said debt, as the same respectively become payable as herebefore set forth.

6. That this By-law shall come into force on the final passing thereof, by this Council.

7. That the votes of the electors of the Municipality of the Town of Durham shall be taken on this By-law on Monday, the seventh day of January, A. D. 1901, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the morning and closing at the hour of five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day as follows:—

In North Ward at Norman Kelsey's.

In East Ward at Town Hall.

In West Ward at Pascoe Saunderson's.

8. On Friday, the fourth day of January, A. D. 1901, at the hour of ten o'clock, in the forenoon, the Mayor of the Town of Durham, will attend at the office of the Town Clerk, in the Town of Durham for the purpose of appointing in writing signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up by the Town Clerk of the votes polled on this By-law and also of appointing one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of the said persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law.

9. On Tuesday, the eighth day of January, A. D. 1901, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, at his office in the Town of Durham, the Clerk of the Town of Durham will proceed to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.
