THE IMPERIAL LIFE

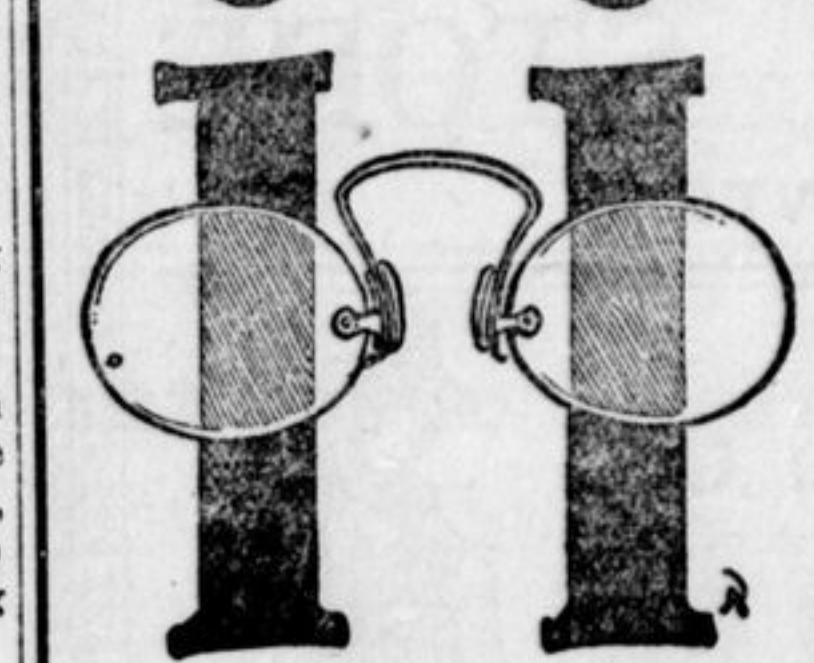
