During Christmas week they have feasts and church gatherings, when every person present makes it a point to give every other person, or as many as circumstances will allow, a Christmas box of some sort or other, no matter how small. During this week nothing has to be paid for; and it is surprising to see how happy everyone is. The Filipino children, don't hang

up their stockings for the simple reason, they have no stockings to hang up, and I don't think they have any idea of a Santa Clause at all. I think Santa Clause would be sadly disappointed if he came here, for he could find no chimneys to go down. I suppose you are going to school


