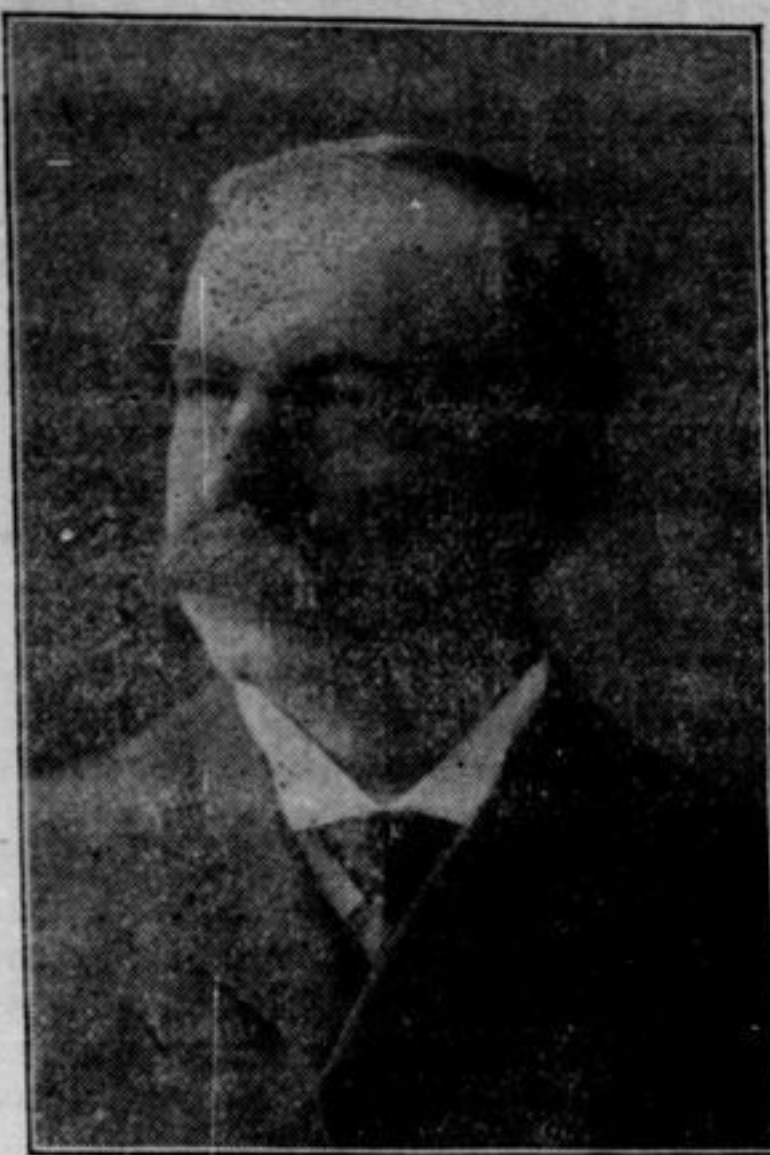
LAST week Mr. Allan Macfarlane was in Michigan giving instructions on how to use the cement block machines, many of which are now being sold and used in the United States and Canada. About sixty-five, we understand, have recently been sold in this country, and the cement block house will soon be a common thing.

In a short interview with Mr. J. M. Davis, Independent Candidate for East and Centre Grey, he suggested the advisability of getting farmers to plant corn this year in consequence of the meadows being partially killed by recent frosts. Under any conditions it is well, we think, to have a good field of corn for fodder.

A FREE Baseball match will be played on the school grounds here on Victoria Day, Saturday, May 24, at 10 a. m. sharp, between the Cement City club and a picked team composed of the business men of the town. It is certainly quite safe to predict an overwhelming majority for Mr. Lucas.
