FLESHERTON.

The nomination for Centre Grey held in the Town Hall here on Thursday last passed off very pleasantly and doubtless satisfactorily to a large majority of ratepayers in the riding. Promptly at 11 o'clock Sheriff Moore, of Owen Sound, took charge of the proceedings, and after the usual preliminaries called for nominations, when Mr. I. B. Lucas, the former member, was nominated by Dr. Christie and Mr. Joseph Blackburn, of this place. At 12 o'clock, no other name having been submitted, Mr. Lucas was declared the duly elected representative of Centre Grey in the Legislative Assembly of this Province. A public meeting was addressed in the afternoon by the member elect and Mr. J. M. Davis, Independent Candidate, whose apology for not having been still in the contest was ignorance of the hour in which nominations took place. Mr. Lucas, in the course of a pleasing address, thanked his constituents—Conservatives, Liberals and Independents alike—for the trust again reposed in him, and assured them that to the best of his abilities it would be his constant aim to further their interests during the next parliamentary term. Mr. Samuel McKnight, of Ephraïma, discharged the duties of chairman, and Mr. Lucas' Italian Orchestra at intervals rendered pleasing music.

During the severe thunder storm on Thursday evening last one of the chimneys of Dr. Carter's house was struck by lightning and considerably damaged as well as some slight damage to other parts of the house. The current passed from the chimney down the furnace pipes, some of which were torn open, threw open the furnace door and evidently spent itself in the cellar. Mrs. Carter received a severe shock, and some others in the village felt that they had had a close call. A barn belonging to Mr. Geo. Ludlow, Toronto line, was struck and burned, and a neighbor, Mr. John Warner, lost a valuable horse. Mr. John Brauniff, 12 con., Artemesia, we understand, also lost a horse, and one of his children was severely injured.

The Artemesia Board of Health met here on Friday last, and on account of the outbreak of smallpox in Osprey recommended to our township council the appointment of sanitary police and the enforcement of compulsory vaccination. Dr. Carter, of this place, assisted at the operation. A little girl of Mr. John Wright's was accidentally knocked down by a bicycle rider on Saturday last, but unfortunately escaped injury other than a fright and badly discolored eye.
