

# SOUTH GREY FAIR.

To be held in Durham on Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 23 and 24.

## Rules and Regulations.

- The subscription of one dollar to be paid on or before the first day of September, entitles to membership. Anyone giving a special prize of two dollars or over will be entitled to membership.
- One dollar on all prizes to be retained by the Society as next year's subscription.
- Animals or articles exhibited must be the property of the exhibitor.
- Manufactures exhibited must have been made in 1902, and must be owned by the exhibitor.
- Produce must be the growth of the current year and must have been grown by the exhibitor. Excepting clover seed.
- Evidence must be adduced of all brood animals exhibited having bred within the last twelve months.
- Each animal must be provided with a chain or rope and be placed on the show grounds among those of its class. Evidence of pedigree of stock being thoroughbred will be required.
- Animals must have attached to them a number by which to designate them, and those under three years must have their ages affixed to them so as to be readily seen by the judges.
- Produce and domestic manufactures must be delivered to the persons appointed to take charge of the show rooms at or before ten o'clock a. m., of the 24th and placed in their respective classes under their direction.
- While the directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of the articles sent to the exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery but they will not make any payment for the value thereof.
- All stock and farm implements must be on the grounds at 11 o'clock a. m. on Wednesday, September 25th, except poultry, which must be on the grounds by ten o'clock a. m., on Tuesday, 24th, be judged in the afternoon and remain on exhibition until four o'clock p. m., of the second day of the show.
- No article exhibited in the show rooms shall be removed before 4:30 o'clock of the second day of the show, when exhibitors must produce their check to the caretaker in charge, before getting possession of their exhibits.
- Non-residents of South Grey shall not be entitled to make more than two entries in any class, with the exception of live stock.
- No person shall be allowed to interfere with the judges while in discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their rights to any premium to which they might otherwise be entitled.
- No person shall be a judge in any class in which he is an exhibitor.
- Exhibitors will be required to bring forward their stock when called by the judges, as no animal will be judged unless so brought forward. Working horses to be shown attached to a waggon. Carriage horses must be attached to a vehicle.
- Exhibitors or others will not be allowed to handle or interfere with articles on exhibition. When entered they must be considered in the hands and under the entire control of the Society.
- Except in the articles of stock and sheep, no more than one premium in one class will be awarded to any exhibitor, or paid if awarded.
- Any person showing the same animal at the same show as competing for two different prizes, or defrauding or attempting to defraud the Society, shall be deprived of any premium whatever at the same show, and be expelled from the Society. [This clause will be strictly enforced.]
- Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation, ownership or entry of any article or animal in the class to which it does not rightly belong, or any representation concerning any article exhibited which may affect, or may have been intended to affect the decision of the judges, the Board shall have power to withhold the payment of any prize awarded, and may prohibit any such party or parties exhibiting in any class for one or more years, and may publish the name of such parties or not, as may be deemed most expedient.
- Judges may use their own discretion as to awarding a first, second or third premium, and in all cases where they do not think the animal or article worthy they may withhold the premium.
- In all cases of doubt or difficulty that may arise before making their awards, the judges shall submit the matter to one of the Directors, and the President or two or more Directors shall finally settle the same.
- Distinguishing Badges—1st prize, red; 2nd prize, blue; 3rd prize, green.
- All entries must be made on or before Saturday, September 20th. This clause will be strictly adhered to.
- Judges are requested to report themselves to the Secretary on their arrival and proceed to their duties at 11 a. m., on the 23rd and 10 o'clock on September 24th.
- Prizes not called for by November 30th will be regarded as forfeited to the Society.
- The Secretary will be prepared to receive entries on and after September 1st, by mail or otherwise, and exhibitors are requested to send lists between that date and the 20th.
- A charge of twenty cents will be made to all persons not being members for admittance to the grounds; vehicles 25 cents; members will be admitted by badge; children 10 cents.
- No person shall conduct or carry on any gambling, theatrical circus or mountebank performances, exhibitions or shows on or within three hundred yards of exhibition grounds. Nor shall any person, without the consent and permission of the Directors, carry on any traffic in fruits, goods, wares or merchandise on the exhibition grounds or within three hundred yards thereof.
- Persons desirous of entering the grounds or buildings to sell goods, fruits or any other articles, will be allowed to do so by paying the license fee to the secretary of the Association.
- The Treasurer will commence payment of premiums on Monday, Oct. 13th and persons having premiums awarded them may call on that day or leave written orders for the money.

At the Annual Meeting held on January 19th, 1884, a motion was made and carried not to put the exhibitor's names on articles for exhibition.
