

## Lacrosse Notes.

**OWEN SOUNDERS STRUCK A SNAG WHEN THEY RAN UP AGAINST OUR BOYS.**

A large and enthusiastic crowd of supporters of the Durham Lacrosse team followed their favorites to the pretty little village of Flesherton on Dominion Day to ascertain the relative strength of their team with the so-called pennant winners of Owen Sound. When the teams lined up on the field it was quite evident that the big fellows from the Sound had the advantage in size and weight against "Doc. Mahan's colts."

After the first blow of the whistle the "Colts" sprang into the game with a determination to win or die. The ball travelled up on the Owen Sound defence, and after a series of the best of combination, Allie McIntyre by a neat shot from the side scored the first goal. Time 30 sec.
