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## Owen Sound Lost

DEFEATED FOR THE SECOND TIME BY THE BOYS IN BLUE AND WHITE.

Over one thousand people took in the lacrosse match here on Friday last to take a glimpse at the lacrosse team from the County Town, which at the earlier part of the season were too fast to be placed into such small fry as that of the Durham lacrosse club (according to the sporting editor of one of the papers of that place.) We of course attribute the ignorance of that sporting editor to the long-winded utterances of that notable figure who takes the management of the Owen Sound team, and who when the referee's whistle blew announcing that time was up and Durham had won by 5 to 2, thought that the one-horse town of Durham has played better lacrosse and won on its merits.

The referee, W. Kearns, of Orangeville, blew his whistle about 3.45 and the teams lined up. Owen Sound in the green and white looked like giants against Dr. Mahan's Colts in blue and white. At the outset Owen Sound played brilliant lacrosse, their combination work coupled with physical strength, swept down on the Durham citadel before our boys really got started, and from a neat shot from the side McKinnon, the inside home, drew first blood for Owen Sound. Time 4 1/2 minutes. The remainder of the first quarter was marked by fast and exceedingly beautiful lacrosse when a pass from the side Dug. Munro struck the nets tying the score. Time 6 1/2 minutes. This ended the scoring for the first quarter. Owen Sound 1. Durham 1.

At the start of the second quarter both teams went in to win, Owen Sound having their combination working perfectly as also did Durham. After several minutes of hard close checking McKinny again did the trick for Owen Sound. Time 5 minutes. Neither sides scored during the remainder of this quarter. Owen Sound 2. Durham 1.

With a score of 2 to 1 starting them in the face for the third quarter, Dr. Mahan's Colts went into the game with a determination to win, the ball travelling up and down the field. Shot after shot was made on Thompson, the Owen Sound goal keeper, and him can Owen Sound thank for not having a larger defeat against them, as time and again he saved their flags. But he couldn't stop them all, and after some close playing Allie McIntyre scored. Time 1 1/2 minutes. This ended the third quarter. Owen Sound 2. Durham 2.

The fourth and last quarter having started found both teams with blood in the eyes. The strong finishers from the County Town sure of victory; the unassuming little boys in blue and white prepared to do or die. After a few minutes play McCartee, the star home who had received several hard blows from the hands of the big stalwart defence men from that burg which no small town should shoulder a lacrosse stick against, scored. Time 9 1/2 min. The ball being faced again Durham showed to the evident satisfaction of the Owen Sound team and supporters as well as their own friends that the Owen Sounders were too slow for their class, and could not keep pace with the fleet footed, never tiring, sure scoring home of the boys in blue. Dug. Munro made a rush and the nets bulged again. Time 1 minute. Again they went at it. Owen Sound seeing that a monstrous score was about to be registered against, sought refuge by playing most of their men on home in order to overcome the strong invincible defence of Dr. Mahan's Colts. But their work was cut out—they simply fell prey to McCartee's sure shot, which after passing three of those stalwart defence men, scored. Time 11 minutes. With two minutes to play, Durham having a lead of 3 goals, and not feeling inclined to rub a defeat too severe, decided to take a rest and have a short practice no more scoring was done. This ended the quarter and game. Owen Sound 2. Durham 5.
