The Largest Attendance in the History of the Institution if Judged by Financial Returns.

GATE RECEIPTS OVER \$427.00.

The twenty-eighth annual Exhibition of the South Grey Agricultural Society was held here on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, and as a financial success it surpassed anything previous in the history of the Fair. Both days were fairly favorable, though Wednesday morning showed signs of rain which, no doubt kept many at home.

The Exhibition as a whole was not, in our opinion at least, equal to that of some of the previous years. The grain exhibit was not extensive, the roots were excellent, the dairy products were good, but the exhibit was rather light, the fruit was fair, some good, the flower display was about a fair average but the fancy and needle work were low in quantity though good in quality.

In Painting Mrs. J. D. Roberts, of Holstein and Mrs. J. W. Brown, of Hanover have upheld their reputation for first class work.

There was a good all-round exhibit of cattle sheep and pigs.

The races were not particularly attractive, with the exception of the Open race in which Bob Scott figured so near first and yet came out second every year.

The Agricultural Implement men didn't have as large exhibits as usual on the grounds, but they made up for it partly by a better display in the Hall.

The only Fakir on the ground was the "Three-balls-for-a-nickle man."

Jordan, the Grocer, did a good business in Fruits and soft drinks.

J. L. Browne, the Photographer, had the best display of Photos ever put on exhibition here.

Gate receipts, \$427. Financially it was a record breaker. The weather was just a little cool.

George Snell, of Egrement, had a fine 20 months' old Durham bull imported from Scotland. He weighed 1600 pounds, that is the bull did.

John Cornish took the red ticket on a cow 11 years old, but she was a cow. John also figured in the races, and won money enough to make him a little sporty.
