

COUNTY COUNCIL.

(Owen Sound Times.)

The final regular session of the present county council opened in the court room at seven o'clock.

After the reading of the minutes the Warden briefly addressed the council in which he referred to the pleasure he felt in seeing all the members of council in their places.

The warden further, as a representative of Durham, stated that the town of Durham was willing to give free electric light for ten years.

The warden read a copy of a resolution passed by the village council of Markdale offering ten years free electric light to the house of refuge if built in Markdale.

Mr. Gordon put in a fairly strong pull for Owen Sound. He thought the building could be erected more cheaply in Owen Sound.

The council met on Tuesday afternoon in council chamber, the court room being used for the North Grey election trial.

Mr. McArthur moved to amend the report of the committee as presented, by striking out the first clause, which recommended the site in Owen Sound.

Mr. Gordon presented report No. 1 of special committee re house of refuge, which elicited a good deal of discussion and was without doubt the most important subject likely to come up at this session.

Agnew, Allan, Brown, McArthur, McColeman, McLean, Preston, Schenck, Watson and the Warden—10 Nays—Messrs. Doyle, Gordon, Harness, McDonald, Pringle, and Shute—6.

On motion council adjourned till 2 o'clock on Wednesday.

At 2 o'clock council met as per resolution of adjournment on Tuesday. The Warden in the chair, the members all being present.
